

ING OF GREECE PREY TO BITTER GRIEFS AND FEARS

THREE, March 28.—Americans have recently visited the palace of King George as a lonely, dispirited man. The utter collapse of the Greek army, the Smyrna catastrophe, the unexampled misery of thousands of refugees, internal convulsions in Greece, execution of the former cabinet members, and the overthrow and subsequent death of his father, King Constantine, have left a deep impression on the youthful monarch. Added to these troubles is the continued delicate health of his wife, Princess Elizabeth of Romania, whose life more and more is in danger.
The king is closely watched by the military committee, and all his movements must have its approval. The latest step of this stern and unrelenting body was to sequester the late King Constantine's body so that they would not fall into the hands of his successors, the new king.
The committee also seized the palace of King George, and for many years by the Greek royal family as a home. The palace is now occupied as a hospital by the American Red Cross. The use of the palace for the treatment of contagious diseases has greatly grieved the king, and he has appealed to the committee to secure other quarters.
Many restrictions are put upon the king, and he is little more than a prisoner. The Greek people are uncertain and fickle in their political and dynastic leanings, and they seem to be quite indifferent to the young king. As a factor in the affairs of the government, King George is quite negligible. He spends his time in seclusion at the palace, visiting old friends, handling old documents, and signing documents prepared by the revolutionary government.
Visitors to the palace represent as being eager to give up the king and undertake the job of king. But they well aware of the fact that such action would probably lead to the present royal family.
It is of Danish-German-Turkish descent. The next in line of succession is his nephew, Prince Paul. Many persons believe George will

be Greece's last sovereign, as a noticeable sentiment for a republic is developing among the Greek people.
Greece, indeed, is so stunned and prostrated by recent events that she is rather indifferent as to who shall take the reins of government. The people seem willing to give the present revolutionary government the fullest opportunity of getting Greece out of the mire of commercial, military and national prostration. But they are not at all sure that the committee will be equal to its enormous and difficult task. They are also willing to continue George as their king so long as he does not go beyond his constitutional limitations, and avoids the fatal foreign alliances of his father, the late King Constantine.

Greatest of all Greece's hopes is a loan from the United States. Without this assistance she can hardly rehabilitate her ruined fortunes, her shattered army, her tottering economic fabric. Twelve years of intermittent war, of misadministration, of unfortunate foreign policies and of continued dynastic changes have left the country and people in a state of despair.

OHIO WILL STRIVE
TO MAKE CHILDREN
ENJOY GOOD MUSIC

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 28.—A movement, the primary object of which is to educate the public in appreciation of good music, and which the sponsors believe will ultimately sound the death knell to the popularity of jazz, has been started by the Department of Education of Ohio in the form of a music memory contest.

A committee, composed of the leading musical men and women of Ohio chosen by Vernon L. Riegel, State Director of Education, and Mrs. Nellie I. Sharp, State Music Supervisor, has made 29 selections of musical numbers, nine of which are from American composers. In the first section of the contest this list has been given to every school in the state, where children in all grades from the fifth to the eighth in the country schools will attempt to learn them so well that they can tell instantly which selection is being played even though only a few bars are executed.

An additional 10 selections are added to this list in the second section of the contest for pupils in elementary schools of villages and cities, while an additional 10 is added, making a list of 49 selections, for high school pupils.

These selections are being played in all the schools, theatres, moving picture houses and concerts in the state, and reports to director Riegel and Mrs. Sharp indicate that hundreds of thousands of school children

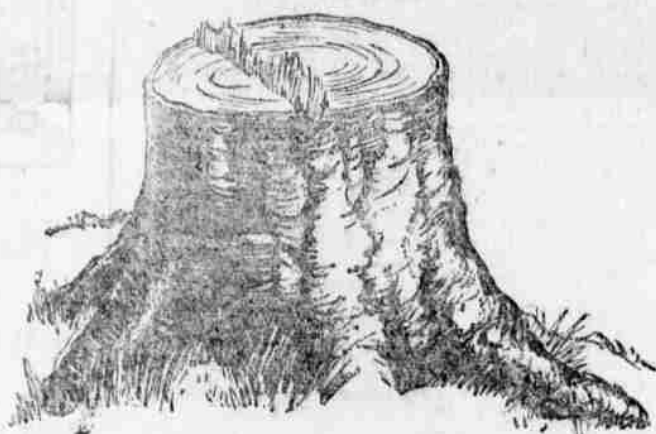

TOMB DISCOVERY AN EASTER LESSON

ST. LOUIS, March 28.—The discovery of Tut-Ankh-Amen's tomb, in the opinion of Dr. George L. Robinson, of M'ormon Seminary, Chicago, is a lesson for Easter.

The discovery in the tomb further prove that the ancient Egyptians believed in immortality and that they were forever reaching out for it, even though Christ had not yet demonstrated that man is immortal, according to Dr. Robinson.

Dr. Robinson also stated his belief that the discovery in the tomb with what had been found before offer further proof to the scoffers that the Bible is not and could not have been a man-made book.

"The discoveries in the tomb give Tut-Ankh-Amen and Tut-Ankh-amen, the father-in-law, a definite place in history, Tut-Ankh-amen going down as the first idealist and founder of one-god religion, with Tut-Ankh-Amen as the obstructionist, who tore down all the good work of the idealist and reverted to the common erroneous belief in many gods in order to maintain his glory," said Dr. Robinson.

Dr. Robinson also stated that in his opinion, the most dangerous place in Egypt today is the entrance to the tomb of King Tut. The Egyptians recent actions of the explorers, Dr.

Robinson says.
"There is no guarantee," he says, "that the Arabs will not rise up and swoop down on the guards and take possession of the tomb to fight to the last man to prevent a resumption of the work. What would we do to the foreigners who broke into our tombs?"

MALARIA GERM IS FOUND CURE FOR PARALYSIS

EDINBURGH, March 27.—The success of a new treatment for general paralysis of the insane by inoculation with malaria has led to a discovery which may revolutionize the science of medicine.

Put shortly, it is nothing more than the playing off of one disease against another. The discoverer is professor Robertson of Edinburgh. The fact that every poison has an antidote capable of cancelling its destructive power, has long been known; but now it would seem that doctors are on the border of hitherto unexplored scientific territory.

Experiments over a long period have proved successful in the treatment of general paralysis of the insane by malaria. The process is that the paralytic is injected with living germs taken from a patient suffering from malaria. The result is an attack of malaria which, after it has run its course, leaves the patient free from his original disease.

It is not merely a process of helping the cure of a disease by sending aid to the army of phagocytes already fighting the battle of health. The new method goes much further than this.

It actually sets one disease against another in the patient's body, so that in the battle forthcoming both may go down to defeat in mutual destruction. British doctors believe that the discovery may inaugurate a new era in medical science and may even lead, eventually, to the extermination of disease. But, of course, years of patient and exhaustive inquiry will be necessary.
