Percival, at the Royal Almoner Westminster, and with the assistance of the Guard, a semi-georgian, semi-pathetic "parade" was formed up for the high officiating dignitaries who were the hereditary grand almoner (the Marquis of Exeter), the high almoner (Dean of Wells), the king's treasurer and keeper of the privy purse (Colonel Sir Frederick Ponsonby), and the deputy keeper of the privy purse (Sir John H. After a short religious service the "maunds," or small baskets containing the doles, were carried around and each of the beneficiaries received the small coins, especially struck for the purpose. According to the royal custom, the alms represented one penny for each year of the sovereign's life (fifty-nine pence in the case of King George, this year), but owing to the trivial value of the penny nowadays, the money is not given in current coinage. Instead, special "Maundy money" is struck, being small bronze and silver coins to the value of one,

two, three, four and six pence, and these can readily be sold to collectors for many times their face value. Incidentally, this is the only private coinage King George is permitted to order from the Royal Mint, and it is not strictly "legal tender." Many of the recipients prefer to treasure up the little coins, but there is a steady market for them if actual cash is needed.

DOLLAR GASOLINE HOLDS NO FEAR FOR PROF. LEWIS

EVANSTON, Ill., March 29.—It is not probable that some hitherto unknown substance will be discovered as a substitute for gasoline, according to the opinion of W. Lee Lewis, famed inventor and professor of chemistry at Northwestern university.

The attention of scientific men and of the industries is being directed rather toward extracting more gasoline from crude petroleum and utilization of low grade sources such as the oil-bearing shales and sandstones," said Prof. Lewis. "Rapid progress is being made along the first line, that is, in the development of so-called 'cracking processes' which increase the yield of gasoline from crude petroleum. I think there is a great promise in the so-called aluminum chloride process. It one distills 10 gallons of kerosene with aluminum chloride he obtains some six or seven gallons of gasoline. The difficulty is at present to recover the aluminum chloride so it may be used over again. Chemists will solve that problem soon, however."

"Oil-bearing shales are already being utilized for gasoline and if the price goes up, will become an important industrial source. "As for the prediction of dollar gasoline recently made in congress, don't scrap your automobile yet. When a congressman gets scientific he's like Polyphemus in love. When the price passes 40 or 50 cents per gallon, alcohol, which can be made for 25 cents per gallon, can be used. The eighteenth amendment didn't cover automobiles."

"These are the lines of progress: Better yields from present petroleum sources, utilization of low grade sources such as shales, better carburetors and less wasteful engines, and, finally, if it comes to cases, a switching to known combustibles such as alcohol. I can't conceive of any miraculous solution outside of the above lines."

PIERCE TO KEEP ENGINEER FORCE

SALEM, March 29.—Governor Pierce is not going to disrupt the rank and file of the highway engineering department and he is not going to dictate to the commission who they shall hire and fire in the engineering department. He will not endeavor to replace competent, efficient help along political lines by putting democrats or others as political rewards onto state highway engineering jobs, or other jobs coming under the control of that department.

At least that is what he told a delegation of highway engineers who visited him at his office yesterday to utter a plea against demoralization of the engineering staff by sweeping changes.

Included in the delegation were President Thomas of Portland, head of the American Association of Engineers; Edna Tolson of Portland, president of the Oregon Highway Engineers' section of the American Association; Professor Craft, of the engineering department at the Oregon Agricultural College; James R. Stewart of Corvallis, honorary member of the association and a leading road booster; and a number of other prominent engineers in the state.

The engineers placed their cards on the table before the governor. They declared that rumors were current to the effect it was the plan of the executive to make a complete cleanup of the highway engineering section and to use the vacancies to

SAVANTS AGAINST COLLEGE MARRIAGE

SYRACUSE, N. Y., March 28.—No marriages for students! That's the rallying cry of Syracuse University educators as the result of the growing frequency here of undergraduate romances. Here is what faculty members at Syracuse University think about it:

Rev. F. Fortenbaugh, head of the department of sociology—"There is more objection to marriage for women undergraduates than men. The practice should be discouraged. It is unwise, if not wrong. The aim of marriage ought to be to establish a home and carry on the function of far life. When a girl is married and going to school at the same time either the family or her college work suffers."

Advises Against it.
Louis Mitchell, dean of the college of engineers—"It is not advisable except in exceptional cases. If a man is over 25 and financially able to support a wife there is no objection to his marrying while he is in college. We have several married men in engineering and I can't see that it makes any difference in their work."

Harry W. Hepper, department of psychology—"It depends a great deal on the individuals and upon how much each is willing to sacrifice. Up to the age of 20 we are going through a process of recapitulation, a sort of summarizing process, and the girl that a man would choose while he is in college he would not want to marry a few years later. Anywhere from 21 to 30 is a good age to marry."

Much "Wiser To Wait."
Eugene Bradford, director of admissions—"It is decidedly wiser to wait until they know their own minds and are sure of themselves."

T. W. B. Crater and L. C. Sweeting, department of economics, interviewed pointedly—"In the time of the high cost of living undergraduates who marry have sublime courage. Speaking economically and considering the cost of apartments in Syracuse, two can live about as cheaply as five. From a scholastic point of view, it might keep them from other frivolities and help them to concentrate."

"Seriously, though, statistics from all the colleges show that their ranks could not be filled up from their own numbers. Assuming that the student has sufficient financial means, it is better to encourage marriage among selected groups like college people than among the lower strata."

John O. Simmons, department of journalism—"As a general rule it is better to wait. However, marriage does steady a student and enable him to study better. It is true, too, that too long a postponement sometimes means postponing marriage forever."

Carl T. Hawley, fine arts—"I do not think it is advisable. There is plenty
