TOBACCOSPRING CLEAN-UP TO
BE HELD IN MAYCouncil Decides to hold Annual
Event As Soon as Condition
of Road to Dump Ground
Will Permit Hauling.

The annual spring clean-up will be held early in May it was decided by the council at its meeting last night. Mayor Rice wanted the clean-up during the latter part of April, but as the road to the dump ground is not passable at this time it was decided to delay the event until May when conditions will be better. This year the dates set will probably include an entire week and will start on Monday. Mayor Rice stated that this suggestion had been made by a number of residents who will find it much easier to get their places cleaned up on Saturday and Sunday when their children and themselves are not otherwise engaged. The city will provide trucks and wagons and will haul away all rubbish placed along the curb line on paved streets.

In connection with the general clean-up the council has ordered that all light and telephone poles be painted in conformity with the city ordinance which provides for the painting of these poles upon demand of the council. The city will also put out the new street signs which have been procured, marking all streets and intersections.

All drinking fountains on the main streets are also to be painted and improvements made to the city property.

MOVES INTO NEW QUARTERS

The Althaus Plumbing company today moved into its new quarters in the Cordon-Bishop building on Cass street. This structure is still in process of construction but is near enough done to permit the plumbing shop to change from its present building on the corner of Lane and Pine streets and occupy its half of the new building. The plumbing company leased one-half of the building before the work was started and the plans were drawn up to provide every accommodation for the business so that the new quarters will be admirably fitted for the company's uses.

The building from which the plumbers are moving is to be converted into a battery and auto service station. The grounds will be fitted up for auto camps, and will be supervised and conducted by Edwin Murphy.
