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REP. FORDNEY IS VISITING AT SALEM

SALEM, Ore., April 5.—Congressman Joe W. Fordney of Michigan, author of the present Fordney-McCubber tariff bill, and one of the best known men in public life, was a visitor in Salem today, accompanied by Congressman "Pat" McArthur. This afternoon the two visited the letters jersey ranch at Dickhead inspecting his famous herd of white jerseys.

"My days of public life are over," said Mr. Fordney. "After 24 years in congress, I think I have earned a rest and I am planning to retire to farmland and hence am interested in livestock, especially Jersey, and as I understand that all world records are now held in Oregon I have decided to show me his herd. I may buy some stock. We will return to Portland this evening."

"We are both out of congress now," said Mr. McArthur. "Mr. Fordney had sense enough to retire voluntarily while I was kicked out of the last session, he had charge of the administration tariff bill. He is known as a staunch stand-patter and an advocate of high tariffs and realized his life ambition when the present tariff bill was enacted bearing his name."
