DRIVE AGAINST TAX DODGERS WILL START

WASHINGTON, April 5.—A nation-wide drive against tax dodgers has been started by the federal government. It was announced at the bureau of internal revenue of the treasury department today.

Thousands of the so-called "warrant of restraint" will be issued in cities throughout the country in a gigantic effort to force the payment of all back taxes due the government. These warrants call for the seizure and sale of the property of all delinquent taxpayers and tax dodgers.

The first move of the federal government in the drive was made at Kansas City where 500 of the warrants were issued.

The warrants will be issued in other cities just as rapidly as the federal forces of the collector's office can prepare the necessary paperwork.

RESERVE STOCK OF PRUNES SHORT

SALEM, April 5.—Present stocks of prunes in California amount to 40,000,000 pounds, according to the latest monthly review of business conditions issued by the federal reserve bank at San Francisco. The review states that this is reported to be 30 per cent less than the number of prunes held at this time last year.

"Reported holdings of prunes in Oregon and Washington are also light," says the report.

In a table prepared for the report it is shown that 94,218,165 pounds of dried prunes were exported from the United States in 1922 and 17,933,740 in 1931. Dried prune prices on a 40-lb. basis at opening in 1931-32 were 5 1/2 to 6 1/2; at opening in 1932-33 at 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 and March 19, 1933, the price was reported at 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 cents.

"Commercial estimates indicate that the amount of the record-breaking 1932 pack of canned fruits now remaining unsold in the hands of canners in this district is but little larger in proportion to the total pack than the stocks held last year at this time," says the report. "The greater part of the present carryover is made up of the lower grade packs of the various fruits, particularly peaches. Unusually large amounts of the can-

ning fruits grown during the 1932 season were small in size and poor in quality.

"Export movement of canned fruits during the 1932-33 season has been comparatively light. It is estimated by important factors in the trade that foreign buyers have taken only about 1 per cent of the 1932 pack of California fruits as compared with purchases amounting to 8 per cent of the total pack during the previous season. Prices for the higher grades of canned fruits have advanced slightly as the season progressed but those for the lower grades have not been generally maintained."

AUTO REGISTRATIONS SHOW BIG INCREASE

Automobile registrations in Oregon totaled 112,103 on March 31 as compared to 95,994 for the same period last year according to a summary compiled by the Secretary of State. Some of the 112,103 registrations on his list were 10,954, are persons over 65 years of age. The increase of more than 16,000 in the total registrations for the first three months of the year over the same period in 1932 is unusually large as compared to the gains in registrations during the previous years. Fees collected during the three month period amounted to \$1,069,225.25 as compared to \$1,005,611 in 1932.
