FRANCE HAS MADE NOTABLE STRIDES IN FIELD OF RADIO

PARIS, April 7.—While the United States has been carrying on an intensive campaign in wireless broadcasting and the use of radio by amateurs, France has been hard at work developing its commercial wireless business through private enterprise. Today France has the largest, most efficient and most powerful wireless equipment in Europe. Unlike England, France took the opportunity during the war of developing this new means of communication.

Today the French government have four high-powered stations. Most Americans are familiar with the great Eiffel Tower which rears its steel framework into the Paris skyline like a giant finger and snatches radio messages from around the world. It is in continuous contact with Arlington, near Washington, and all the other great American stations. Next in importance comes the station at Nantes which is allocated to the French navy; the station at Lyons, which was erected during the war and is used by the Post Office for communications to America, Africa, Europe and the French colonies; and the great Lafayette station, near Bordeaux, which was built by the American navy and later acquired by the French government. The Lafayette tower sends daily communications to Madagascar, Martinique and Saigon. The government service consists of news, propaganda and official communications.

The chief wireless installation in France is now that of St. Asie and consists of two stations, one for European traffic and one for world communication. It was necessary to build this powerful station because of the inadequacy of the submarine cables and telegraph lines, and the lack of capacity of the other wireless stations for continuous long-distance communication. The St. Asie station undertakes rapid and intensive service to North and South America and with the Far East and Indo-China.

To show the progress radio is making in this country it may be mentioned that the total number of words transmitted from France to the United States increased from 323,734 in November, 1922, to 486,979 in January, 1923. The number of daily messages sent by radio in January was more than the combined number sent out from France by the two chief submarine cable companies.

Commercial radio is operated by the Compagnie Radio-France, a subsidiary of the French Wireless Company. The parent company, the "Compagnie Generale de Telegraphie Sans Fil," has a concession for 20 years from the French government, granted in October, 1920, but dating from January 1, 1921. The public interests and state requirements in time of war are safeguarded. The parent company is in alliance with the Marconi Company, the American Radio Corporation, the German Telefunken Company, and the Nippon Yusen Kaisha of Japan. It is associated with companies of Belgium, Italy, Poland, Roumania, Switzerland, Syria, South America and other countries.

France has long-distance two-way stations at Buenos Aires, Beirut, and Saigon, and a long-distance transmitting station is being built in Madagascar. It will thus be seen that the French radio system covers the world, and a large radio manufacturing industry has been built up in France by private enterprise which has free scope for development abroad. The state does not aspire to make a profit on its radio service, which is, indeed, heavily subsidized.

The giant St. Asie station, which is 20 miles from Paris, is designed to transmit 200 words a minute. For transmission and reception the station is capable of a total of 100,000 words an hour, compared with an average of 50,000 words a day by the best submarine cable in America. The price charged is approximately a third less than the cable tolls.

CARRY MAIL DESPITE PERILS
Storms in the Arctic Often Endanger the Lives of United States Postal Workers.

Throughout the United States and its possessions the government has established one of the most efficient and greatest postal services in the world. Promptness in delivery of the mails has always been its motto, as records of the post office department show. In the far north the "mailman" experiences the severest hardships, as evidenced by the history of the Alaskan postal stations.

In the Arctic the "mailman" is usually not called upon to make extensive overland trips more than once or twice in the long winter night. These trips, however, are fraught with immense hardship and danger.

Working from the seacoast postal station at Tanana, Alaska, from which stations in the bleak interior of northern Alaska are served, the dog sledges which carry the mail must travel 600 weary, perilous miles overland to the "hottest north" office, at Point Barrow. One trip a winter to this office is a season's work for the mailman on that route.

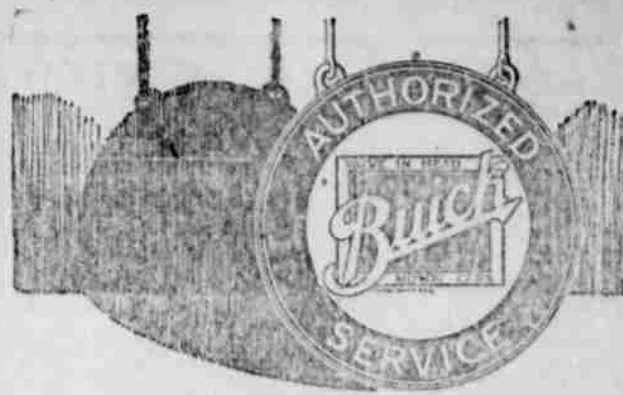
The trip means weeks upon weeks of the most arduous traveling in utter loneliness, with only the savage, half-wild dogs of the team as companions, all the time under the pall of the long Arctic night, only relieved by the shifting, terrible glory of the northern lights.

Many cases are on record where mail carriers, traveling behind their dog teams, have been caught in deadly blizzards and lost. In almost every case the mail has been rescued by searching parties and taken through to its destination.—Joseph Edgerton to the Washington Times-Herald.
