NEW SERVICE KEEPS FAMILY TOGETHER

CHICAGO, April 7.—How the family automobile may become to the church goes, what the family wagon has always been to the church, is being worked out at St. Mark's church, a downtown Episcopal parish in Minneapolis, the Rev. Philip Osmond, rector of the parish, told the church of Chicago in an address here.

The Sunday school as a separate institution has been abolished in his church, Dr. Osmond said, and the church and children are brought in, for morning worship. Five other trials have convinced him that this is a success.

When parents and children assemble at 11 o'clock in the church, the family service of morning prayer, conducted with some slight modifications to suit the changed program, is a success. A five minute service, followed by the offering, and then a hymn to be sung, using the hymns from the parish hymn book, are they have 15 minutes of quiet reflection. Meanwhile the regular service is proceeding for the edification of their elders.

When the regular service is ended, the children are waiting for their parents, the family automobile is loaded, or the family group proceeds to street cars, and all return home ready for Sunday dinner.

The chief object of this plan is to restore the family pew in its traditional position," continued Mr. Osmond. "We found that because of our situation on the edge of the downtown district, many of our parish children were not attending our school. But the difficulty was not so much that the children were going elsewhere for instruction, as that the family unit in worship was shattered, or that ultimately we lost the entire family because parents so naturally follow their children.

"The great fault of the traditional Sunday school was that it did not train children in church going. It could no more do this than a blackboard diagram could teach a person to swim. The only way to learn how to swim is to get in the water and swim."

Mr. Osmond said the attendance of the children had been increased 30 per cent in the five months and that the regular attendance of parents at services had been well ahead of the same period for preceding years.

"The presence of children has established the service," he added. "Formerly we were a rather staid downtown congregation but that condition has changed."

The plan has been supplemented by activities for the children starting at 10 a. m. so that parents who desire may attend adult bible class.

LAW ENFORCEMENT MEETINGS ANNOUNCED

Temperance Forces Join in Campaign to Make Oregon the Driest Dry State in the Union—Speakers

A law enforcement conference will be held in the Methodist church this city, April 16th. The various temperance organizations have perfected an amalgamation of their forces and are contemplating an intensive campaign for a better enforcement of the prohibition laws.

The first session of the conference will begin at ten o'clock. The same will be in session throughout the day and culminate in a reading law enforcement mass meeting to be addressed by Mrs. C. J. Vagstad of Indiana, representing the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union and W. J. Herzig, of Portland, representing the Anti-Saloon league, on the general subject, "Law enforcement—the necessity for it and some of the obstacles in its way."

Similar conferences are being held in all of the principal county seat towns of the state on this immediate itinerary. Mr. Herzig, superintendent of the anti-saloon league of Oregon, and Mrs. Mary L. Mallett, State president, Woman's Christian Temperance Union jointly gave out the following invitation: "It is our firm conviction that there cannot be a wholesome enforcement of the prohibition law or any other law unless the sentiment of the people is thoroughly alive and the citizenship generally demand the enforcement of the law and then back up public officers in the aggressive enforcement of the same. It is our earnest hope that those who are interested in the enforcement of the law will heartily join in these conferences and thus lend their cooperation and influence in the creating of a stronger sentiment for law enforcement. These conferences will give officials and citizens an opportunity to counsel together and discuss local difficulties and remedy them. It is not too much to state that the entire future success of prohibition will depend upon the successful enforcement of the prohibition law. Here then is an opportunity for every one hundred per cent law-abiding citizen to do his or her part in this crusade and help make Oregon the 'driest dry state in the union.'"

RELAY RACE TO REVIVE FAMOUS "PONY EXPRESS"

DENVER, Col., April 7.—The romance of the Old West will be revived during the coming summer when a pony express relay race is staged through the territory west of the Mississippi River to the Golden Gate in San Francisco, with a view to keeping alive the pioneer spirit that developed the vast areas of the plains and mountain country.

The race will start at St. Joseph, Mo., and cover a distance of nearly 2,000 miles.

Many cities along the route are already planning parades and celebrations to mark the occasion of the renewal of the West's early mode of rapid transportation.

Opportunity for making the event one of national importance was brought out at a meeting here of representatives of the Mark Twain Memorial Association, which is fostering the movement for annual Pony Express relay race.

It is expected interest will center not merely in the cities through which the racers will travel, but also will draw spectators from a broad belt in the Western country.

Big Purse Offered.

Purses totaling thousands of dollars will be offered for winners in the race, and it is expected that Tom Mix, movie star and former cowboy, will be among the entrants, with a relay of horses.

A permanent organization to complete arrangements for the event was created here with the formation of the Pony Express Memorial Association. Former United States Senator James D. Phelan, of California, was chosen president; John A. Baker, of Colorado, vice-president; and Earle Stahl, of Reno, Nevada, secretary. Following the first meeting of the association here, in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Mark Twain Memorial Association, delegates from many Western states said a visit to the grave of Buffalo Bill (Colonel William F. Cody), stop of Lookout Mountain, west of Denver.

To Re-Live Olden Days.

In the Pony Express relay race, which will be known as the Western Trail Jubilee, teams of modern horsemen will re-live the days when there were no mail trains, automobiles or airplanes. Over the 2,000-mile route racers will change horses every 15 miles, as in the pioneer days, with 25 miles as the task of each rider. And as something of that sort.

While the little teams are in season children who care to do so may accompany themselves with modern transportation. The transportation is arranged by the National Automobile Association, and similar activities under the supervision of an instructor.

SCOTT URGED TO FORGET RECORD AND SAVE SELF

NEW YORK, April 7.—Fourteen days after the opening of the American League season Everett Scott, iron-clad shortstop of the New York Yankees, is expected to reach the 1,000 game goal for consecutive playing and then probably will turn his attention to whatever marks he immediately beyond. Scott's is a laudable record and is likely to stand as an epic of durability in the years to come, but it will be just as well for the Yankees and the player himself if he can proceed to forget all about records at an early date.

Strain Too Great.

The strain of playing day after day without let up has taken its toll on Scott's ability as a ball player, according to close students of the sport, and the fact that he played a stationary shortstop during the last world's series is cited as evidence that he had become stale from overwork at that time. This can happen again very readily and just as inconveniently if Scott persists in shooting at marks beyond his present record, they claim.

They do not, of course, advocate that the player vote himself a vacation in the midst of the championship season. Neither, however, do they wish him to play individual baseball at the expense of the team. The charge that Scott has "played for his average," as the saying goes, has never been substantiated, but it there is any truth in it the Yankee would benefit if the claim over Scott could be broken. He could then settle down to day-to-day baseball and forget his records.

Played 966 Games.

As matters stand Scott has appeared in 966 consecutive games since early in 1915—in all, 163 in 1916, 157 in 1917, 126 and 128, respectively, in the abbreviated seasons of 1918 and 1919, and 124 games each in the last three years. That is too much ball playing to be good for any man.

In fact, Scott might do well to take counsel from what is being said and written about him. Hardly an old man, even in a baseball sense, he is being characterized by many critics as "old."

In the writer's opinion he has had years of useful service before him if he can be made to realize that he is making a martyr of himself for the sake of an obscure paragraph in the record book.

Miss Frank's hopes were revealed in letters from the files of the probation office, where they were placed after they had been received by members of the Binghamton Police department.

Miss Frank, a high school graduate and pretty, first wrote to Chief of Police Lewis T. Dewitt asking his advice in a search for an eligible bluecoat. When he did not reply she came down the scale a bit and wrote to a member of the vice squad. She wanted, she said in plain words, a policeman who would not only protect her but would love her passionately.

But Catherine had perseverance. She wrote to another young officer this letter:
