The installation of the sprinkling system for the high school has been practically completed. The lines have been run to all parts of the yard and are buried a few inches below the surface. Attached to these lines at regular intervals are valves to which will be fastened the sprinklers. On the ends of these lines nearest the sidewalk, the valves will throw the water into the yard but away from the sidewalk. The entire system can be controlled from one valve and can be operated independently. The system will result in a beautiful lawn as is expected and the Parent-Teachers Association which is having the work done is well pleased with the steps taken for the improvement of the yard which will be in time has been very successful.

POWDER RIVER DENIES ITS WILD WEST SMOKE "LET 'ER BUCK"

 HELENA, Mont., April 11.—The Powder river section, an important eastern Montana, is protesting against the world famous "Powder River, Let 'er Buck" slogan.

It is contended that the slogan is not expressive of the present Powder river section, and is detrimental to its reputation as an agricultural region. The section is only sparsely settled by farmers since the early days, but has been rapidly being transformed into a productive food grain.

When the slogan first came over the top in the Powder river section, it was offensive to the still peace-loving "Powder River, Let 'er Buck" slogan heard from one end of the Powder river's frontage to the other.

It is so expressive of all the reckless bravery to be seen in the Powder river section, and has been taken up by several organizations and has been applied to the civilian as well as to the military, but now the farmers are objecting to its use.

The slogan may go out of business as a "wild and wild" and a peaceful farm slogan.
