OIL BORING IS DOWN 940 FEET

The strongest showing of oil so far encountered by the drill in the test well south of Oakland was struck last week, says the Oakland Tribune. At a depth of over 940 feet the hard gray shale through which most of the drilling has been done changed to a rather soft, coarse sandstone.

the 8-inch hole. This will probably cause several more days delay in the actual drilling operations. The well now being put down here is unique in that it is the deepest hole ever put down with an 8-inch core barrel. This core barrel was perfected by E. B. Latham, Los Angeles, and was included as a part of the equipment of the rotary rig which is being used. It was intended to be used only for the detailed examination of new formations. Difficulty in the use of fish-tail bits, however, led to experiments in the continued use of the core barrel which proved so successful that the hole has now reached a depth of nearly 1000 feet. While the method of drilling is comparatively slow it has enabled the operators to keep a perfect log of the hole which will be invaluable in future drilling operations in this section.

KLANSMEN PRESENT AT STRICKLAND FUNERAL

Robed klansmen representing Umpqua Klan participated yesterday afternoon in the funeral of C. E. Strickland, whose death occurred on Monday morning. Mr. Strickland was a member of the local Klan and that organization participated in the burial service. As the funeral cortege arrived at the cemetery two rows of masked klansmen formed before the grave and stood with uplifted hands as the flower covered casket was borne between their open ranks. As the body was placed in the earth the robed men silently dropped upon it their symbolic evergreen and giving a mystic ritualistic sign went back to their waiting automobiles and were carried back to Roseburg. This is the first Klan funeral held in this city in which the klansmen took part.
