FARMERS PROFIT THROUGH SELLING COWS AND STEERS

WASHINGTON, April 18, I. A. P.—Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska corn belt farmers averaged 45 cents a bushel more for the ears they fed to steers during last winter than they would have received for it at local market prices. Cow figures compiled by the Department of Agriculture show feeders averaged \$7 per 100 pounds in cost. A surplus of \$1.20 per 100 pounds was necessary on the average to pay for feed, labor, interest, equipment, and miscellaneous charges after certain credits. The "fished" cattle sold on an average for \$8.77 per 100 pounds, so that the feeder made a profit of 67 cents per 100 pounds.

CHICAGO TRIBUNE WINS LIBEL CASE

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 18.—Affirming the decision of Circuit Judge Harry Fisher of Cook county, the supreme court today ruled that the city of Chicago can not maintain its libel suit against the Chicago Tribune. The case was the first in which a municipality had attempted a libel suit. The newspaper was charged with having damaged the credit of the city through editorial criticism of its corporate officers.

The opinion of the court is based on the constitutional principle of the American government—that every citizen has a right to criticize the government and its administration so long as they do not advocate overthrow of the existing government or violation of law.

The Bank Check and How It Performs Many Different Services for Business.

Americans are the greatest users of bank checks in the world. Less than eight per cent of all business transactions in the United States is conducted with money, or, to put it another way, more than nine out of ten transactions are conducted with commercial instruments, of which one of the most important is the check.

When a Check is Useful

Mr. Smith could pay his bills by sending cash by mail, but this method of payment would be unwise, because of the danger of the money being lost in transit. Again, he might go out and buy express or postal money orders for the amounts due, but to do this regularly would require a great deal of his time, and would involve needless expense. Besides, a money order does only half the work a bank check does. Although it is in reality a kind of a check drawn by the express company, or by the post office, in favor of some person or firm, it is not returned to Mr. Smith after it has been cashed, but goes back to the express company or to the post office that issued it. On the other hand, a cashed check after it comes back to the bank and is cancelled is returned to Mr.

SMITH, who can keep a check receipt in proof of the fact that a bill has been paid.

More than this, in order to have accurate records Mr. Smith has to have one account in which all his receipts can be entered out of which all payments are made. He therefore aims for a course that will either pay or credit him to the bank, when it is safely kept and can be drawn on as needed. The latter course amounts in a small way to a check book which is a record of deposits, the pass book is issued in the bank name and is handed to him together with a supply of bank checks. Mr. Smith is not sure to pay his bills by checks up to a total of \$500.

His check will be received by any bank where the follow-up of the person to whom it is made payable, which is written or stamped on the back of the check is known to be genuine. The bank receiving the check will either pay or credit it to the payee, and the cash or amount will be deducted from the amount of the check. The check, after being properly cancelled, will be returned to him at the end of the month. He will then have a complete record showing that he has posted \$500, that he has some \$100 in cash, that he has a balance of \$250 and that his bills have been paid as shown by the cancelled checks with the bank statements upon them.

The bank will pay all bills presented to it bearing the express signature as given on the check in any sum covered by the amount of his bank balance, and he will continually increase by paying his bills and decrease by checks cashed and deposited in his account. The process of making deposits and cashing checks continues day after day, both the depositor and bank accumulating their own records.

Millions of such transactions are handled every day by the banks and trust companies of the United States. In one year more than 500,000,000 checks are paid. The check is the life of the business and the life of the present era.
