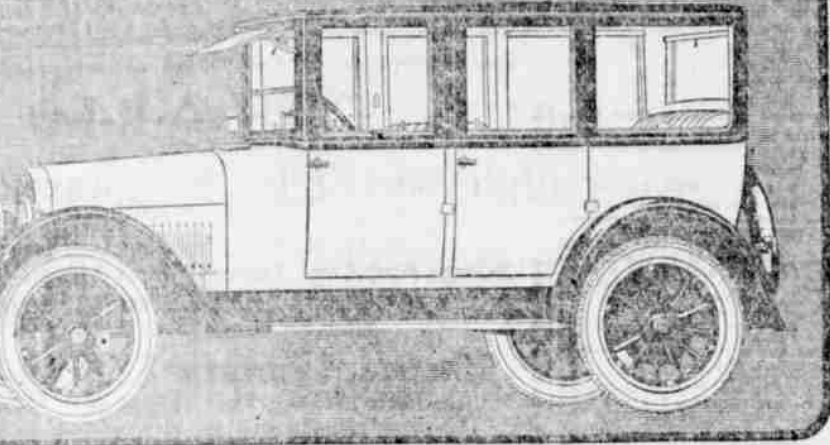

HORSE MARKET IS REOPENED

CITY, Mont., April 18.—The horse market here, which has been closed for the last four months, will be reopened soon.

The sales are no longer what they were before the automobile came in, but Miles City is still asserted to be the largest horse market in the world. In 1915 and 1916 French and

British army buyers made their headquarters here and sent trainloads of animals to the Atlantic coast to be shipped to France. Fort Keogh, a few miles west of Miles City, has been the principal remount station for the United States army since it was established in the late '70s.

METHODISTS WILL SELECT CITY FOR NEXT YEAR'S CONFERENCE

CHICAGO, April 18.—(A. P.)—Within the next four days the plans of meeting the Quadrennial General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church will have been decided. The book committee of the church began its annual five day sessions here today, and before it finishes its work on April 22, it will have picked the places for Methodism's great gathering next year. It will have determined the salary to be paid bishops of the church for the ensuing year and it will also determine what dividend shall be paid retired ministers of the church out of the produce of the book concern for last year.

The book committee considered one of the most important in all Methodism. It is composed of twenty-five members, fifteen of whom represent the fifteen general conference districts into which the world territory is divided. The other ten come five each, from the territories immediately in the environment of New York and Cincinnati, where the two main houses of the book concern are located.

SUGGESTS TEN COMMANDMENTS REPLACE STATE CONSTITUTION

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 18.—(A. P.)—A bill to repeal the constitution of Missouri and all state laws, and substitute for them the ten commandments and the league of nations, was introduced in the lower house of the Missouri legislature during the session just adjourned. The bill, however, was not given serious consideration, and was not even referred to a committee by the speaker.

In explaining his action in introducing such a bill, Representative J. Dal Swiers, republican of Christian county stated that it was for the purpose of aiding the democrats in their apparent plan to change all the laws, by changing them all at once. Another bill introduced was one providing that all street cars be equipped with an automatic light on the rear which would show the word "stop" when the car was not in motion. It got through the house but in the senate it was amended, the amendment providing that it should be in effect only during the total eclipse of the sun and moon.

IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Louise Burkhell was born at Grand Prairie, Illinois, August 28, 1864. She lived with her parents for a time in Kansas and California. After they died she came to Oregon on a farm near Gilde where they have since made their home. She also leaves a sister, Mrs. M. Stevens of Oakland, California, who was present at the services.

Mrs. Burkhell was of a quiet, retiring disposition appreciated most by those who knew her best. Rev. W. S. Gordon of the First Methodist church of Roseburg had charge of the service which was held at the Oak Grove church, where a large audience was in attendance. The choir furnished excellent music. The burial service was in charge of Undertaker M. E. Ritter of Roseburg.

MEATLESS DAYS FOR REFUGEES

MANILA, April 18.—The Russian refugees under Admiral Stark who are held at the Mariwela quarantine station, have decided to observe two almost meatless days a week in order to reduce the cost of living. A small ration of bacon is the only meat they will receive on Tuesdays and Fridays by limiting the diet to this extent the supply officers of the ships which brought 800 men, women and children to Mariwela from Vladivostok, say that the daily cost of rations per person will be reduced from 24 cents to 22 5-10 cents.
