SALES OF BIBLES TO CHINESE IN 1922 BROKE ALL RECORDS

SHANGHAI, April 20.—Chinese in China paid \$37,000 (Chinese) for Bibles in 1922, buying last year more Bibles than in any previous year, according to reports given out in Shanghai by the agency of the American Bible society. The sum paid is some \$400 (American) above the previous high mark, and the record number of Bibles issued was 19,356.

That the so-called anti-Christian movement has awakened a new interest in the Scriptures in China is attested by the fact that in 1922 a half dozen book shops in Peking alone sold more than 2,000 Bibles and New Testaments to the value of \$1,200 (American). It is said there went almost exclusively to non-Christians, largely students in the government schools.

A total of 1,987,324 volumes were circulated in China by the American Bible society. These were in 16 lan-

guages and dialects of the country, and in eight foreign tongues.

NEW WAVE LENGTHS GIVEN RADIO STATION

Conference Results in New Assignments to Class B Stations—Interference Will Be Some What Eliminated.

Local radio operators last night heard a very welcome announcement from Radio K. P. L. at Los Angeles. Because of the fact that Class B stations on the Pacific Coast have been assigned similar wave lengths there has been some interference, particularly in Los Angeles and San Francisco, where there are two of these Class B stations in operation. In order to avoid interference as much as possible attempts have been made to go to higher wave lengths but here confusion resulted with the ship and shore stations operating on 620 meters. A conference of district inspectors was recently called by Secretary Hoover and as a result the stations on the Pacific Coast have all been assigned to wave lengths. Stations K. P. O. and K. F. L. B. at San Francisco will operate on 405 and 509 meters; K. F. L. and K. H. J. at Los Angeles will take 595 and 482 meters; K. G. W. at Portland will work on 422 meters. The difference between stations in San Francisco and Los Angeles will enable the operators in either of these cities to tune to one station without interference from the other, while operators all along the coast will be able to pick up the high powered stations even with instruments which are not especially selective.

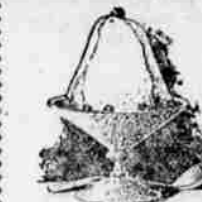
