WOOL GROWERS ARE "COMING INTO OWN"

(By Associated Press.) SALT LAKE CITY, April 21.—Prosperity of a worldwide, permanent nature, is predicted by F. J. Hagenbarth, president of the National Wool Growers Association. Asserting that in the west the sheepmen were "coming into their own," with prices for wool 40 to 50 cents per pound, Hagenbarth stated that in the inter-mountain country there are about four million sheep which will bring nearly fifteen million dollars for wool and about twenty millions for lambs.

HARDING INVITED TO MAKE STOP HERE

Sen. Stanfield's Secretary Sends Message to Harding Asking Him to Make Stops in Main Cities of Oregon.

An invitation for President Harding to stop in Roseburg and other Oregon cities on his way through from San Francisco to Portland, has been forwarded to Washington by E. J. Adams, Senator Stanfield's secretary. President Harding plans on a trip west in June and Mr. Adams has telegraphed him an invitation to make short stops in the various Oregon cities along the line and is following the message with a letter explaining the wonderful comprehension he could gain of Oregon's scenery and her industrial and agricultural possibilities by making the trip through the state in daytime.

FOREST FIRE IS SWEEPING VILLAGE

(By United Press.) ALLEGAN, Mich., April 21.—A forest fire is sweeping south-western Michigan and is slowly consuming Bravo, a small village 15 miles west of here, according to reports to the sheriff's office here. The fire has swept through a portion of the town already. No lives have been lost and over 2,000 inhabitants were forced to flee with meager belongings.

CHIEF OF POLICE IS GIVEN NEW UNIFORM

Chief of Police Ketch blossomed forth today in a new uniform with brass buttons, gold letters, "everything." This is the first time that members of the city police force have been uniformed although such action has been proposed on several occasions. As the man on the day shift is frequently sought for information of various kinds Mayor Rice decided some time ago that he should be uniformed in order that strangers in the city might go to him for such information as they might desire.

HAMMER SLAYER IS UNDER ARREST

Clara Phillips Located in Honduras, State Department Announces

EXTRADITION IS ASKED

Governor of California Wants Escaped Murderess Returned to State From Which She Escaped

(By United Press.) MEXICO CITY, April 21.—The Mexican and United States officials working together have located the "underground route" by which Clara Phillips, apprehended hammer murderess, crossed Mexico into Honduras. Steps are now being taken to arrest her if she eludes the Honduras authorities.

MURDER STORY IS RECITED

(By United Press.) LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 20.—The sheriff's office late today, telegraphed to Governor Richardson at Sacramento, formal notification of the conviction of Mrs. Clara Phillips for the murder of Mrs. Alberta Tremain Meadows, 29 years of age, widow, who was beaten to death with a hammer here July 12, 1922.

MALE COMPANION IS FUGITIVE

It was stated the man named Carson, who with Mrs. Carson, was traveling with Mrs. Young, was believed to be Jesse C. Carson, said to be a distant relative of Mrs. Phillips. He is said to have left Los Angeles January 2 for Mexico City. He is wanted here to answer an arson charge, and the message to the sheriff's office to the governor asked that the man at Tegucigalpa be detained on that charge and also on the further one of aiding and abetting a prisoner to escape.

STARVATION STORY WAS JUST A HOAX

NORTHPORT, Mich., April 21.—Edward Horn, one of the three who risked their lives traveling across the slush, ice and open water this week and who reported nine men and a woman starving on South Fox Island, causing airplanes to be sent, today admitted that the starvation story was a hoax and part of a plan to get tobacco for the woodcutters on the island.

EARTHQUAKE DOES DAMAGE IN RUSSIA
