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CONGRESS EXISTS TO PERMIT ORATIONS

British Are Lead to Believe that the American Public Has Passion For Extreme and Lengthy Speeches.

(By Associated Press.)

LONDON, April 22.—Recent dispatches from the United States describing the closing days of Congress have given the British public the impression that much of the time of that legislative body is taken up with speeches unrelated to governmental affairs or to public events.

Comparisons are made between the rigid rules of the British parliament, which limit the length and character of the debate and those of the American congress, which are so flexible that the members sometimes talk interminably. British readers are told that Americans have a passion for oratory.

"The American Congress," says the Washington correspondent of the Morning Post, "is supposed to exist for the making of laws, but I am inclined to believe its real reason for being is to enable the men who constitute the membership to talk about any subject under the sun except the pending bill, and to ride their hobby horses."

There being no limit to debate in the senate, and the rules of the house being elastic, men talk incessantly, knowing they will not be called to order for their remarks not being germane to the matter under discussion.

"A few days ago the agricultural appropriation bill being before the House of Representatives," this correspondent continues, "Mr. Hawes of Missouri spoke for half an hour or so on the dog. Mr. Hawes broods dogs and loves them, and this was an opportunity no member of congress could neglect. His speech was recorded verbatim in the official 'Congressional Record' copies of which are furnished to the member free of charge and may be sent from the mails to his constituents free of post and."

"If he wants to give his speech wider circulation he can have it printed in pamphlet form at the government printing office at the actual cost of the printing and paper, and this pamphlet also the government will obligingly circulate through the mails without the payment of postage. The member's constituents receive these speeches and are duly impressed. They are proud that their representative is an important man and is not idle. The average constituent is an ingenuous person. He believes that speeches pass bills."

S. CAROLINA BEATS SALES TAX BILL

(By Associated Press.)

COLUMBIA, S. C., April 22.—A deluge of telegrams, coupled with a storm of newspaper criticism, and verbal complaints by constituents, recently turned the South Carolina state legislature from what was regarded as probably the most revolutionary piece of tax legislation ever attempted in the state and possibly in any state in America.

The state senate, seeking means of raising revenue needed for public buildings at the six state colleges and universities, the penitentiary and the various reform schools and public institutions, decided at the eleventh hour on a sweeping measure which its proponents called a "sales tax bill."

The measure carried with it, however, a sweeping constitutional tax measure that did not stop at workers and professional men making comparatively comfortable money, but also imposed a tax on more modest wage earners.

The measure as passed by the senate taxed manufacturers, merchants, retailers, professional men and workers one-half or one percent on their gross receipts from whatever source realized, after an exemption of \$500 had been allowed. This feature touched the households who under the law was compelled to keep account of the sale of old clothing, old furniture or anything else for which they received money.

In order that some might be missed the bill required that every worker and business man must pay a license of \$2 a year for the privilege of engaging in business and must keep said license posted in his or her office. Sales of farm products by the producer alone were exempted.

Hardly had news of the passage of the measure, which was in the form of an amendment to a House tax bill, been carried over the newspaper wires of the state, when a deluge of telegrams struck the senate. The House refused to concur in the amendment and it went to conference.

The conference reported a modified bill but still carrying the occupational and gross receipts features. This was rejected. A new conference committee was formed and the second report eliminated the occupational feature but retained a modified gross receipts feature together with a two percent tax on tobacco, amusements, jewelry and other so-called luxuries. This in turn was rejected.

Unable to devise a bill that would all the backers of the measure announced they have abandoned it and the conference on the state appropriation bill started to vote the amendment voted by the two houses of a point within the cost of operating the government in 1932.

The legislature met January 12 with the avowed intention of taking in to the taxes of the farmers, who comprise 85 per cent of the population of South Carolina.

MYRTLE CREEK BOY ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

George W. Jackson, son of Fred and Mrs. J. A. Jackson, of French Creek, died while enroute to the Good Samaritan hospital from injuries received by being crushed between two logs while employed in logging operations by the Bridal Veil Lumber Co., east of Portland, Oregon, Monday, April 14, says the Myrtle Creek Mail. The remains were brought to Myrtle Creek and laid to rest in the Oddfellows cemetery. The funeral was held from the Methodist church, Rev. Anderson, the pastor, presiding at the funeral service.

George Jackson was born at Louisville, Illinois March 1, 1895; came to Oregon with his parents in 1902; grew to manhood in the Myrtle Creek vicinity. He enlisted for service early in the war between Germany and the United States and served 22 months in France. On his return home from overseas he returned to his usual pursuits, with little to say of the service he had rendered his country abroad, an characteristic of the average World War veteran. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Jackson; his four brothers, Tom, H. M., Bert and Oscar Jackson; and his one sister, Mrs. Addie Rice. One sister died several years ago.

BOSTON WOMAN MAKES LONG HIKE

CORVALLIS, April 21.—A hike of 5193 miles through 21 states has been completed by Mrs. Isabelle Partington, of Boston, Mass., whose son, Clyde Partington, is a senior in agriculture at O. A. C. She left New York City February 26 and arrived in Corvallis April 13. During her 45 days of travel, she spent 50 hours on foot. Motorists were generous and she had no trouble in covering 250 or 275 miles a day in many instances.

Mrs. Partington traveled all night and twice. She seldom camped at night, with the exception of a few times when she stopped with people with whom she had traveled during the day. Following the Atlantic coast, her route led her through New Jersey, Delaware, North and South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama. From there she went to Texas, crossed New Mexico and Arizona to San Diego, Cal., and followed the coast highway through California to Oregon.

A tornado in Arkansas and several hail storms interfered with progress, but the weather as a whole was good. Mrs. Partington related Clyde Partington, who has hiked across the continent several times, urged his mother to make the trip. She will return to Boston in May, where she conducts riding classes each summer at a girls' summer camp.

All Roseburg people have been invited by the Citizens of Grants Pass to join in the carnival and circus to be held at the Grants Pass fair grounds on April 27 and 28. This event is being held in an effort to advertise the great scenic attractions of Southern Oregon, particularly the Oregon Caves, and the proceeds of the entertainment will be used for that purpose. GRANTS PASS TO STAGE CARNIVAL AND CIRCUS

BUREAU, Calif., April 22.—The Berkeley City council recently enacted an Anti-Noise law, one of the results of which is that the owner of a motor car at night can be charged with a misdemeanor.

Recently, they say, a man was called upon to give the date of his birth. Family tradition pointed to it as being a year "when New Year's Day was very, very cold—the lowest temperature on record" for that district.

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STATE INCOME TAX NEW INFORMATION WILL MEET DEFEAT ON BONUS LAW

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21.—If the electorate votes in November the way it is signaling the referendum on the state income tax, that proposed law has been knocked into a cocked hat.

The last six days 10,000 signatures have been gathered in Portland on referendum petitions of the Oregon State Income Tax Referendum League. The estimate shows that practically another 10,000 has been obtained, making roughly, some 20,000 signatures for the referendum and against the tax. Never before have voters been so responsive to a petition, and this is a strong indication of public sentiment toward the new tax plan.

About 8500 signatures are necessary to invoke the referendum.

"I feel very optimistic," said Cyril G. Brownell tonight. "I am satisfied that the income tax will be defeated substantially in the special election in November. The way the petitions are being signed up in the upstate counties proves conclusively that objection to the income tax is not confined to Multnomah and that the referendum is not a Portland movement. There are as many signatures to the petitions in the outside counties as there are in Multnomah."

It was the plan of Mr. Brownell to collect 15,000 signatures although but 8500 were needed, so that he would have a margin for defeat. He did not anticipate that he would obtain 20,000 names in less than a week, and the work of circulating is not ended. Early next week, Mr. Brownell will gather in all of the upstate petitions and call a halt on the circulation in Portland; the machinery being in action, it cannot be stopped instantly.

Checking the names to ascertain if they belong to registered voters is now in progress and this requires time and considerable clerical force. The petitions in 21 counties outside of Multnomah will be checked in the offices of the respective county clerks.

The Oregon Just Tax League obtained 2500 signatures and then began checking. Although the attorney general gave an opinion that voters can sign both of these referendum petitions, Mr. Brownell believes that only a limited number of electors signed the petition.

Tax Enacted as Compromise. The income tax was enacted by the recent legislature as a sort of compromise. There were several of these state income tax bills and the one which finally passed was a compromise. An impression prevailed among the legislators that there was a demand for the income tax, yet the legislature declined to refer to the people for adoption. Failure of the legislature to so refer caused the referendum to be invoked.

It is thought by many observers that if the present income tax is defeated in November that no income tax will be likely for ten years to come and any organization which undertakes to initiate an income tax measure will be doomed to defeat.

Anti-Oleo Act Threatened. Sufficient signatures in 10 petitions for a referendum on oleo bill No. 118, known as the anti-oleo measure, have been obtained to insure placing the issue before the voters of the state at the general election in November 1934, according to a statement from the office of the Associated Industries of Oregon which organization is sponsoring the call for the referendum.

According to Milton R. Elmer who is looking after the local work connected with this referendum campaign, more than 5000 signatures have been checked over and found valid. To set the referendum on the ballot, 4475 names of registered voters must be filed with the secretary of state on or before May 21. Mr. Elmer says he has been in "on over the top" with 10,000 signatures.

Filing of the referendum petitions before the date for the petition drive is on being effect will ensure the referendum will be on the ballot in November 1934.

The following information has been received by the adjutant of the local post of the American Legion and by the Red Cross from the World War Veterans State Aid Commission, relative to the timetable for the filing of claims for soldiers bonuses:

1. Time limit for filing applications for cash bonus has been extended to December 31, 1933.

2. Time limit for filing loan applications has been set as June 30, 1937.

3. Refunding the cash bonus and therefor taking the loan: Any person who has taken the cash bonus and who at the time desired the loan by accepted the cash bonus as reason of misrepresentation as to his right to elect for a loan may upon refunding the cash bonus with interest thereon at 5 per cent, obtain the loan, provided, that the applicant can satisfy the commission that he desired the loan at the time of receiving the cash bonus.

The World War Veterans State Aid Commission means as much solatium as possible to the soldier in infirmity as to his benefit through the American Legion law.
