the lobby, so I lit a cigarette, and asked him something about the weather. My voice sounded kind of queer, that was the only emotion I had.

Thursday, April 5, 1923, San Francisco. Came ashore at 2:45. Accounts in the paper about Lane. Only know he is a rabbi. Met Alice at the Emporium at 9:30 p. m. Went to Filmore for dinner. While there told her about the rabbi affair. Told her I thought I would leave the city. After dinner we went to the Castle theatre. He wouldn't go down town. Caught across Key route ferry at Oakland on S. P. train to Modesto. Arrived 3:45 a. m. Friday.

Modesto, Cal. Friday, April 6.—Hired a taxi or to Paris ranch. Told Frank what had happened in San Francisco. Had I much of chance to prove my story would go back to San Francisco.

Modesto, Cal. Saturday, April 7.—The rabbi is dead, so now in the eyes of the law I am a murderer. Can't say I feel like one. I am also a deserter from the navy. That's what I'm worried about. Wired Dad to send Frank \$75 for me. Discarded my bright uniform yesterday for a pair of overalls, shirt and sweater. I look like a bum now. Walked to Modesto from the ranch.
