MARSHFIELD, April 23.—Marshall Keith and S. G. Whitsett, Chevrolet dealers, returned from a quick trip to Portland and report the roads in excellent condition. Leaving Marshfield at 12:25 p. m. Sunday they arrived in Roseburg at 4 p. m. The following statement of the road conditions is given out by the travelers:

The road from Myrtle Point to Canas Valley is in better condition now than ever before and the trip is a wonderful one from a scenic standpoint. Residents of Marshfield do not realize they have at their own door one of the scenic drives of the world.

Leaving the Canas valley store there is three miles of rather rough road to the foot of the mountain. There is no spot in the three miles that could be called dangerous and if one drives easy it can be called a pleasure trip compared with some of our city streets. The old grade is followed for three miles and at the foot of the mountain one connects with the new grade and follows it to the Pacific highway and Roseburg. Leaving Roseburg the Pacific highway is followed all the way to Portland and is well marked with direction signs along the road and in all the towns. There is only one stretch from Albany to Corvallis that is not paved and this is a good mountain road where one can make the 30-mile run right along.

The most timid driver should not be afraid to make the trip. It occurred to Messrs. Whitsett and Keith while driving to Portland and return that there is an opportunity for advertising Coos Bay that is overlooked.
