## How Your Home Town Creamery Makes Ice Cream and Butter Products

That the dairy interests of Douglas County are not the smallest asset of this section is conclusively proven by the amount of butter that the Douglas County Creamery is daily turning out. This institution is only one of several such concerns in the Emporia Valley, but is perhaps doing a greater volume of business than any other county creamery. Therefore the butter made here is only a part of what is going to the markets of the state from this section. The local creamery is daily churning from 700 to 1400 pounds of butter. Probably four days each week the product runs up to the four figure total. In addition to this output, the creamery is also manufacturing a big lot of ice cream daily, having only recently increased its capacity for this line of work. The product runs out under the name of "Jersey" Brand. Electrically and steam are both employed in the creamery for power, the steam being used in sterilizing churns, cream ripeners, cream cans and various other uses, while an adequate ice plant is maintained for supplying the storage rooms and use in manufacturing ice cream. This feature is of the latest type, and the cream mixture is first placed in a sterilizing machine where it is subjected to 150 degrees of heat, then passes through another apparatus which strains it, and from there it begins to go through the cooling process, finally reaching a copper vat of 650 gallons capacity, and they are both needed in the summer season to keep the trade supplied. From these vats the cream goes into the freezer electrically operated, and then from there, when it reaches the proper degree of cold, to the hardening room, where a temperature of zero is maintained. The daily capacity of the hardening room is 2000 gallons, and from the product in this last department is shipped the finished ice cream, hard and firm as an iceberg, to the trade through the southern Oregon country.

Be it said to the credit of the Douglas County Creamery and the city, that butter products bearing the "Jersey" brand have often taken first prizes at Portland in competition with products of other creameries in the state, and food inspectors, making regular tours all ways speak in highest terms commendatory of the splendid sanitary conditions maintained by the management of the Douglas County Creamery.

## MONEY NOT USED FOR ELEVATING GUNS

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The appropriation made by congress last session for elevating the guns of the American fleet will not be used for that purpose. Secretary Denby announced today, because of unintended erroneous statements by navy representatives in recommending the appropriation. The secretary intimated that the department would go before the next congress with a new program so the records might be kept straight. He said this court had the president's approval.

had been a bridesmaid. Those who accompanied Lady Elizabeth to the altar today were Lady Mary Cambridge, Lady Mary Cambridge, Lady Mary Thynne, Lady Katherine Hamilton, the Hon. Blanche Hardinge, Miss Betty Cairns, the Hon. Elizabeth Elphinstone and the Hon. Cecilia Boscawen. The last two are youthful cousins of the bride.

Bride Is Beautiful. Lady Elizabeth made a picture never to be forgotten as she came toward the altar in her wedding gown. The dress was of chiffon moire, in color the lovely ivory of old lace. The corsage, with its severe lines and silver and pearl embroidery, recalled the traditional dress of Joan of Arc. Long sleeves of Nottingham lace added a graceful touch to the gown. In the train there was more lace, lent by Queen Mary. A light veil of white tulle, with a wreath of orange blossoms, augmented rather than concealed the charm and beauty of the bride.

As the bridal procession approached the altar the choir and the clergy took their places, the Duke of York arose and advanced to the steps of the sanctuary. As Lady Elizabeth came to the altar the Duke took his place on her right hand, and the Earl of Strathmore moved a little away to her left. Grouped around the bride were the lovely bridesmaids, their heads crowned with silver wreaths that seemed to rise from a white, luscious mist in which pink flowers shone.

Lady Elizabeth now stood in the heart of a picture of rich and subtle harmonies. Scarlet uniforms of the gallant soldiery, the red and gold covers of the clergy and the vivid hues of the dresses of the great ladies contrasted, yet blended with the graver tones of the tapestry and stone and ancient painting of the historic sanctuary.

Ceremony Pronounced. The Dean of Westminster, in a calm, clear voice, read the homily with which the marriage ceremony begins, using the raised prayer-book form, which attests somewhat the hardness of the phrasing of some of the old Tudor English. His opening phrases uttered, the Dean gave way to the Archbishop of Canterbury, who read the charge to the bride. The venerable Archbishop called upon any who might know of any impediment to the marriage to come forward and declare it or "forever hold their peace."

Albert Frederick Arthur George, with those have this woman to be his wedded wife, came the question from the Archbishop. The response of the bridegroom, a firm "I will," was clearly spoken, but not sufficiently loud to reach the ears of all within the Abbey. The response of Lady Elizabeth was plainly audible.

The Earl of Strathmore then gave his daughter in marriage, and the groomsmen came forward with the ring, while the Archbishop and the bridegroom repeated the ceremonial sentences.

In Historic Setting. The ring was on her finger and the bride and bridegroom knelt on the velvet cushions above the ancient mosaic where brides have knelt throughout 700 years of English history. The Archbishop gave the prayer of blessing, while the choir chanted the tune of an ancient psalm. The Duke and Lady Elizabeth were pronounced man and wife and received the benediction.

Then the Archbishop of York delivered the wedding address. There followed a ceremony hallowed in English history—that of signing the marriage register. With the completion of the ceremony the bride and groom emerged. Lady Elizabeth, her veil thrown back, proudly smiling, while the Duke walked as her side looking every inch a royal bridegroom. As man and wife they passed through the nave and out to the carriage that waited to take them back to Buckingham Palace.
