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BIG STILL LOCATED BY LANE SHERIFF

EUGENE, April 24.—A 150-gallon capacity moonshine still and 500 gallons of mash sufficient to make 500 gallons of liquor was captured Sunday by Sheriff Fred Lane and his posse squad on top of a mountain near Hendrick's bridge on the Kenzie highway. The still is the largest and most complete ever captured in this part of Oregon. Operators had evidently been told off that the officers were coming and fled. No arrests have been made.

The huge booze-making plant is as complete as the moonshine figuring in Kentucky's history. The plant had evidently been in operation for months as it had been perfected in every detail. A house has been built over it to hold 300 gallons of mash. A moonshiner lived and took refuge on the spot.

A huge copper still was also captured of a black furnace. Beside it were vats, fillers, conveyors, and were arranged as the plant operated as a complete unit. It took 100 shots of dynamite to work the still after the big copper still had been torn loose from the furnace. The still was brought to Eugene and is on exhibition at the sheriff's office.

The moonshine making plant is located on top of a mountain 300 feet above the McKenzie river. It is reached by a trail. All the force used in its construction had been carried up the mountain on their backs. The officers had difficulty getting the large round copper still which stand six feet high and five feet in diameter, down the mountain to the highway.

Either the operators of the still or their friends played a trick on the sheriff's men who were at the scene of the still during the night and prepared to wait until the deputies made camp on the mountain and while they were on their conholtering trip someone came by packs, cleaning out the camp. It is believed that someone had their vantage point on top of the mountain discovered the night long before they could be caught.
