VIENNA, April 28.—A dancer at a local theatre appeared in such scant attire recently that a group of students, in protest, threw a gas bomb at her.

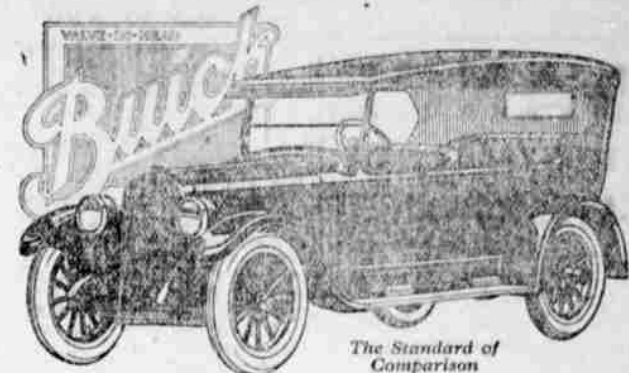
She now has compelled the theatre to insure her person for 2,000,000, 400 crowns, or \$20,000.
