A lively bunch of Roseburg boys invaded Glendale last night, led by Scoutmaster Lintott. An organization was perfected of 14 boys of that city. FIFTEEN ARE GIVEN PARDONS

Governor Pierce Grants Release to Fifteen Convicts in State Penitentiary

WOMAN GIVEN LIBERTY

Mother of Ten Children, Convicted of Dry Law Violation, Is Released and Fine of \$1,000 Is Remitted

SALEM, May 1.—Records in the office of the secretary of state show that Governor Pierce, in common with his predecessors in the executive department believes that the pardoning power is a necessary and proper function in dealing with persons convicted of crime.

The records show that Governor Pierce has issued 15 pardons since he entered the executive department, practically all of which were recommended by the officers who presided at the trials of the members of the state parole board.

A list of the pardons follows: Dick Weston, received at state penitentiary from Yamhill county, November 15, 1921, to serve two years for forgery.

S. Martinez, received from Union county, June 13, 1922, to serve an intermediate term for larceny.

Lillie Jacobson pardoned from Multnomah county jail after serving part of her sentence for larceny.

Bert Trindle arrested for non-support, pardoned from Multnomah county jail on condition that he comply with the terms of an agreement entered into between himself and wife with relation to a property settlement.

Alvin Chase, received at the penitentiary from Malheur county April 30, 1921, to serve 15 years for forgery.

Mrs. Frances Kolkowski, manufacturer of liquor, pardoned from three months' sentence and remission of \$1000 fine on condition that the woman's older children support the family and that two women's organizations in Lane county watch over the offender to see that she sins no more.

Arthur Burnik, pardoned from Multnomah county jail after being sentenced to serve one year for larceny. Pardon later revoked for violation of its provisions.

James Moore, received at penitentiary from Clackamas county to serve term of 15 years for criminal assault. Afflicted with tuberculosis.

Fred Moxley, received at penitentiary from Umatilla county on charge of forgery.

J. L. Huiras, pardoned from Clackamas county jail after serving part of sentence for drunkenness.

Roy York, received at penitentiary from Baker county to serve three years for attack on boy.

Mrs. Peggy Lyle, pardoned from Multnomah county jail after serving part of term for larceny.

J. R. Robinson, pardoned from Multnomah county jail, following conviction on charge of forgery.

Jesus Faron, received at penitentiary from Malheur county to serve three years' sentence for larceny. Deported to Mexico.

Myrtle Hayes, pardoned from Multnomah county jail on condition that she accompany her sister to California.

Morris Dahlberg, pardoned from Multnomah county jail after serving part of sentence for larceny.

Groves C. Martin was granted a restoration of citizenship, having been paroled while serving a 19-year sentence for manslaughter.

Accepts Position—Arthur Davis has accepted a position as chief clerk with the Shell Oil company. Mr. Davis will be in charge of the clerical work at the office and will also handle the script book sale.

ATTEMPT MADE TO ATTACK GIRL

Insulting Advances Made by Laborer to Daughter of Benefactor

LIFE IS BARELY SAVED

Enraged Father and Grandfather Attempt Life of Man, Who Was Hurriedly Put Into the County Jail

Arthur E. Elkins, aged about 35 years, was arrested last night charged with attempted rape on Virginia French, the 10 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. S. French. Elkins was arraigned this morning and waived examination and was ordered held for the grand jury under \$4,000 bonds. As he will be unable to furnish bonds, he will remain in confinement until grand jury meets.

Elkins it is alleged has been employed at odd jobs around the city and only recently Mr. French found work for him. Elkins is an ex-soldier and for that reason Mr. French endeavored to help him in every way possible and even gave him a room in his own home. In addition to finding work for him to do.

Yesterday evening Mr. French and his wife went to a party at the home of T. E. Singleton whose birthday was observed last night. The children were left at home, their grandfather James Crawford of Denver, who is visiting here, and Elkins being left alone in the house also.

Soon after the girl had retired, Mr. Crawford heard her cry out and heard Elkins voice also. He rushed to the room and found the man in the room with the girl, it being alleged that he had tried to make advances to her and had tried to embrace her. Crawford threatened to kill Elkins and forced him out of the room. He then telephoned her parents, who were followed home by Mr. Singleton, deputy sheriff, and Roland Agee, who was also in attendance at the party.

Mr. Singleton at once placed Elkins under arrest and started away with him. Mr. Crawford as soon as he was relieved from guarding Elkins, made a rush for his own room and a moment later emerged with a gun, and it was with considerable difficulty that the officer succeeded in getting the prisoner away from the house without his being seriously injured or killed by the enraged father and grandfather.

Elkins refused to talk to the officers or make any statement whatever. He appeared to have had some experience with the law and officers are of the opinion that he has been in some sort of trouble before and an attempt will be made to trace his record.

The little girl who was the subject of his alleged advances, was not injured by him, her cries having succeeded in bringing aid before he could hurt her. She was badly frightened and shocked, however, and it was necessary to call a physician to quiet her. The advances and proposals which Elkins is alleged to have made, are sufficient, it is believed to warrant a charge of attempted rape and he will answer to the grand jury on this charge.

Elkins has been employed here for some time by the Shell Oil company and has been engaged in construction work at their new plant in Edenbower. When he was released from that work, he appealed to Mr. French for employment and was given a job driving truck and was provided with a room in the transient man's home.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL PLANNED

First Baptist Church Planning for Vacation School in Study of Bible—Miss Bess Lewis to Serve Again.

A church vacation school will be conducted in Roseburg again this year under the auspices of the First Baptist Church, June 11 to July 16. The school sponsored last year by the Baptist church was the first school of this kind ever held in the city of Roseburg and proved to be a wonderful success. The committee which has the organization of this school in charge have practically completed their plans. They have secured Miss Bess O. Lewis, one of the most popular and efficient of the high school teachers, to serve as superintendent of the school. Miss Lewis was also superintendent of last year's school and the experience and knowledge gained last year will prove of great benefit in making the school for 1923 an even greater success. The church vacation school for 1922 had a total enrollment of 175 pupils. The committee states that it will be necessary to place the registration limit below that limit this year in order that the work may be done in the most efficient and successful manner and in order that the pupils may receive the greatest benefit from attendance at the school.

OREGON ELECTRIC IN MUCH TROUBLE

DAUGHTER AND FATHER TO HANG

Emil Picarillo and his daughter, Mrs. Florence Lassandra will be executed simultaneously to save one the horror of waiting until the other dies. They were convicted of the murder of a policeman.

FOUR BOYS HURT IN AUTO WRECK

Car Skids and Turns Turtle on Hill Near Winston Bridge

OCCUPANTS STUNNED

Received Head Injuries Which Temporarily Deprived Them of Their Senses—Car Is Badly Wrecked

Ray Jost, Wallace Perry, Harold Haskill and William Humphries, high school boys, were quite badly injured last night when the car belonging to W. S. Jost and occupied by the four boys, skidded off the road near Winston and turned over the grade. The boys started out yesterday evening to hold a weiner roast near Dillard. As they reached the first covered bridge it started to rain and so they turned back. They reached the top of the Winston hill and started down when the accident occurred.

None of them were able to give a coherent account of the wreck as they were stunned and shocked. From the looks of the car it appears that they threw out the clutch after reaching the top of the hill and started to coast down. The car must have reached a high rate of speed and caused the driver to apply the brakes. The pavement was wet and very slippery and when the brakes were applied the car turned completely around and then went over the grade, striking on the rear, right fender, washing in the back end, turned completely over and righted itself.

The entire back part of the car was completely caved in. The top was mashed and the windshield broken. The front right wheel was also dished. Wallace Perry and Harold Haskill, who were in the back seat, escaped death miraculously. Both received bad cuts and bruises about the face and body and several stitches were required to close their wounds. They were both rendered unconscious by the wreck.

Jost and Humphries who were in the front seat were also knocked out. Jost apparently suffered a slight concussion of the brain, but it is not believed that the skull is fractured. He was still somewhat delirious this morning. Humphries received bad cuts about the face and head and three broken ribs.

Humphries and Perry, who appeared to be the worst hurt, were rushed into the city and taken to the office of Dr. Houck. The other two boys were also brought in a few minutes later and their injuries attended by Dr. Melvin. The car was drawn back into the road and in spite of the wrecked condition of the body, was driven into the city under its own power.

The boys had a very narrow escape from death considering the manner in which the car left the road. Sheriff Starmer who investigated the accident stated that the boys had not been drinking and that the boys had no liquor in their possession the accident being caused entirely by the speed of the car and the condition of the pavement.

I. W. W. STRIKERS PARALYZE BUSINESS

WHITFIELD TRIAL IS STARTED TODAY

(By United Press.) VANCOUVER, Wn., May 1.—When the trial of George E. Whitfield, charged with the brutal murder of Arna Nooko near Battleground, on March 8th, opened here today the state's attorney challenged for cause the prospective jurors expressing prejudice against capital punishment, indicating that the death penalty would be asked. It is predicted that the drawing of the jury will require two days. The first witness will probably be examined Thursday.

RADIO STATIONS HUNT KIDNAPERS

(By United Press.) SCHENECTADY, N. Y., May 1.—Nearly every radio station in the eastern states today was engaged in searching for the six-year old son of E. F. W. Alexanderson, chief engineer of the Radio Corporation of America, who was kidnapped yesterday. The boy was traced to Albany and the police are searching that district while descriptions were being broadcasted by all wireless stations.

SALVATION ARMY DRIVE STARTED

Annual Campaign to Raise Funds for Local Work Is Put Under Way Today

\$3,000 IS MARK SET HERE

Lassies Will Make Thorough Canvass of Business and Residence District in Effort to Raise Quota

Capt. H. Briggs, who has charge of the local branch of the Salvation Army, announces that today is the opening day of the annual home service campaign, by which campaign it is the desire of the local Salvationists to raise the sum of \$3,000 for the work for the coming year.

In view of the figures just presented of the activities of the Salvation Army for the past twelve months, the work has certainly been carried on an extensive scale. The captain also announces that there will be a thorough home-to-house canvass made by Salvation Army lassies in uniform and also a canvass of the business houses.

It is just a year ago since the last campaign was conducted and the principal reason for conducting these campaigns annually is to eliminate the old-fashioned method of financing the work of the Salvation Army by the officers continually making their appeals.

So it is the hope of the local Salvationists that they will have the co-operation of every philanthropically minded citizen, who will be ready to receive the Salvationists when called upon with a liberal response.

The statistical report of work done in Roseburg during the past twelve months shows: Senior Work—Open-air held, 282; open-air attendance, 17,558; indoor meetings, 310; indoor attendance, 7,555; conversions, 51; number of hours of visitation, 539; Junior work—Meetings held, 102; attendance, 2,639; conversions, 87; Relief Work—Number of persons given meals, 175; number of persons given lodging, 126; number of families given groceries, 95; number of persons given Christmas dinner, 105; number of persons afforded temporary relief, 639; number of persons given garments and shoes, 492; total number of persons helped, 1,297; total value of relief given, \$611.75.

MAY DAY RIOTS STAGED IN MILAN

SHIPS TO REMAIN AS DRY AS USUAL

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 1.—Definite indications were given by Chairman Lasker of the U. S. Shipping Board after a conference today with President Harding that the government-owned ships would be kept "bone dry" for some time at least, although under yesterday's supreme court decision they locally could carry and serve liquor on the high seas.

RELIGION BASED ON SELF-DENIAL

Christian Science Exists to Serve All of Humankind, Lecturer States

MUCH INTEREST SHOWN

Dr. John M. Tutt, of Board of Lectureship, Gives Interesting Address on Subject of Christian Science

Considerable interest was shown last night in the lecture given at the Christian Science church edifice by Dr. John M. Tutt, C. S. B., member of the Board of Lectureship of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. Dr. Tutt was introduced by J. H. Bernier, who said:

"More than nineteen hundred years ago, Christ Jesus, the founder of Christianity, proclaimed to the world—'Ye shall know the Truth and the Truth shall make you free.' He also said, 'He that believeth in me, the works that I do shall be done also.' He talked with God as naturally as man talks with man. His records show that he did many mighty works and comparatively little preaching. He did good to all and harm to no one. For this good, the priests and rabbis of his time crucified him on the cross. His life was a continuous rejoicing in the complete victory of proving life to be deathless."

"More than fifty years ago, a New England woman, Mary Baker Eddy, heard this voice of Truth that makes free. She recovered from a serious accident, pronounced fatal and incurable by the best physicians obtainable in her day. She knew that God had healed her and also proclaimed to the world 'Ye shall know the Truth and the Truth shall make you free.' She also talked with God as naturally as man talks with man. Her records show that she also did mighty works and comparatively little preaching. She did good to all and harm to no one. For this she was maligned and persecuted. Through all, she rejoiced in a greater understanding of God that he had revealed to this age, through her, the Science of Christ, which casts out devils and heals the sick."

"I feel privileged to stand here tonight, a living witness to this permanent healing power, through the ministrations of Christian Science. I was pronounced incurable by three of the best physicians in a western city not far distant from here. For over seventeen years Christian Science has kept me well and happy. 'Among the many activities established by Mrs. Eddy, promoting the cause of Christian Science, is a board of lectureship. We have with us this evening a member of this board whom I now take pleasure in introducing to you.'"

Dr. Tutt delivered a very interesting lecture on the subject, "Christian Science, True Evangelism," and in part said:

A consideration of evangelism may properly begin with angels. It was angels who announced to the wise men the coming of Jesus the Savior. Popular belief conceives angels to be celestial beings humanly defined. God's messengers, bearing communications from God to man. Just why God, who is everywhere, should need a medium of transmission of His thought does not appear in reason, although it does appear always in human belief. Certainly, if, as Job declared, God is "in one mind," His activity is mental and expresses itself in ideas. The essence of anything is the idea of it, or what it is in mind. It is therefore proper to conclude that angels are not merely God's messengers but are the actual messages themselves. Angels are God's communications to man. Human beliefs may bestow upon them finite, though ethereal, forms, may clothe them with clouds of glory, and give to them all the imagery of the poet's fancy, but no grandeur or beauty, no heavenly atmosphere, can exceed the simple truth that God, in mind, communicates with man spiritually, consciously, and that the communication is vital, instantaneous, and direct. "And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host." A multitude of right ideas. "The kingdom of God is within you," said Jesus. Within what? Within brain, stomach, lungs, blood, bones? Surely not. Evidently within consciousness, within understanding. The heavenly host has never failed to be and to abide with the spiritually-minded. True evangelism changes the querulous cry, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!" (Continued on Page 3.)
