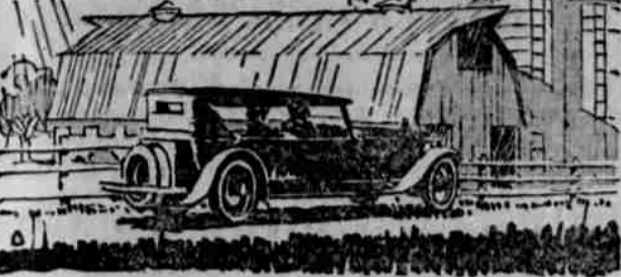

TO GIVE LECTURE ON CARE OF AUTO

Buick Representatives to Show Pictures and Give Demonstrations Two Days

WILL EXHIBIT MODELS

Cutaway Models of Cars Will Be Shown for Education of Automobile Owners — To Tell How Cars Are Made

The manufacture and assembling of an automobile will be demonstrated at the Armory tomorrow night, and Thursday evening, when W. R. Fenton and E. Duffie, representatives of the Buick Motor company, present their motion picture and lecture to all local automobile owners and others who are sufficiently interested to be present. The lecture will be very educational in nature and will be of interest and benefit to all auto owners as the lecturers will devote a great deal of time to explaining the care of the motor and giving information on the way of handling a motor to get the best results and to save wear.

Mr. Fenton and Mr. Duffie arrived in Roseburg yesterday evening from Coos Bay where they have been giving a similar demonstration which attracted large crowds. They carry with them a cutaway motor and chassis of both the Buick 4 and Buick 6. These models show in detail the workings of the cars and anyone interested in automobiles can obtain a great deal of information concerning their construction, and operation by inspecting the cutaway cars. These will be an education even though the owner possesses a car of different make as the mechanical operation will show many ways in which the average driver can lessen the wear on his machine.

A car will be assembled on the platform, while a speaker explains each operation in detail. In addition to this several reels of motion pictures will be shown, giving educational matter on the manufacture of automobiles, the care shown in their assembling, and other matters of interest including performance. The lecture and demonstration are being arranged through the local Buick agency and will be held at the Armory on Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 8 o'clock.

RELIGION BASED ON SELF-DENIAL

then mine unbelief." Into the glad Hosanna, "Lord, I believe, because I understand!" An ignorant Christian in a paradox. The scientific Christian is the enlightened Christian. Redemption means not subscription to scholastic dogma or theological creed, not emotional acceptance of a man-made salvation, falsely labeled divine. Redemption is rather the acquiring of a gift of God, a gift purchased with a price—the price of daily endeavor to know the liberating and transforming Truth, the Christ. So Christian Science appeals not to the emotions. It touches indeed the hearts of men, but its primary appeal is to understanding. I state boldly that Christian Science is the only religion that has not faltered in the face of logic and reason. Christian Science is bulwarked in the truth that no wrong conclusion can logically follow correct premises. From reason to revelation is a step in sequence, and that step is followed by spiritual understanding—the angelic presence. Spiritual understanding ushers man into the atmosphere of God.

True evangelism then, addresses itself to the individual consciousness! It has none of the elements of mass psychology. It is not mesmeristic; it is spiritually scientific. It does not mystify; it clarifies. It does not storm; it convinces. It is said that Charlemagne evangelized the Teutonic tribes. At the point of the sword he drove thirty thousand savages into the Rhine and baptized them. Does any one imagine that procedure made a Christian nation? A militant preaching can never alone do the work of true evangelism. Christian Science, mighty evangel sent from God, combines the militancy of Michael, who "lights the holy wars" (Science of Health, p. 567), with the kindness of Gabriel, who through love leads gently out of the mesmerism of sin and disease into holiness and health.

The Dual Aspect of Salvation Humanly viewed, salvation in all its phases—salvation from sin, sickness, discord, death—is an event. It is something that comes to pass. But divinely considered, salvation is a condition—the condition of man as he really exists, not materially but spiritually. God's man is always saved man. Like Christ, he is "the same yesterday, and today, and forever." To him salvation does not come to pass. That is because God is the saving Principle, or cause, and all that He makes is in a continuing and eternal state of preservation. The real man exists always at the point of salvation. God has not conceived His creation in terms of imperfection, deterioration, disease, insubordination, or transgression. Christian Science reveals that the debasement of man is a myth.

True evangelism, then, has a twofold aspect and presentation. It unfolds first the truth about salvation—the truth concerning God and man; then it relates the infinite truth to finite human interests by showing: first, salvation as the great fact of being; secondly, salvation as a human event. The real man of God's creating needs no redemption. It is the false, human, finite self that needs to be evangelized.

Christian Science, let it be said, is not a course in spiritual aviation. It does not soar in sublime detachment from humanity and its needs. Christian Science, truly evangelical, comes to earth and all its uncleanness, discord, disease, and sin, not to partake of the earthly, but to cleanse, to harmonize, to heal and to save. Christian Science is in the world, though not of it. No less important than its divinity is the humanity of the gospel.

Can it be doubted that Christian Science is truly evangelical? What is its effect upon human lives? It revivifies the individual, satisfying his thirst for spiritual things and besting his body. It preaches and practices the univided ministry of Christ Jesus in Christian Science, every man assiduously does the work of an evangelist. He preaches the gospel—he applies Truth to the false creations of the human mind. He daily evangelizes himself and others.

A scientific Christian is a Christian not for what thereby accrues to him, though he receives without measure the spiritual and temporal rewards of service. Happiness and satisfaction are not the objects of his search, but they are the inevitable results thereof. Primarily he is a Christian Scientist for what he can give. Self-denial is evangelism. The Christian religion is built upon the foundation of self-sacrifice. Concerning this point of selflessness Mrs. Eddy wrote, in the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to Scriptures" (p. 241), "We should forget our bodies in remembering good and the human race." To be saved from one's self is all the salvation a mortal needs. It is a man's true nature to be an evangelist, even as Jesus was. It is a man's natural function to practice Christian Science—to utilize for himself and others the power of Truth over error. It is a man's natural office to preach and to practice the gospel of Love.

The lecture was heard by a fair sized crowd which more than made up for its lack of numbers in the keen interest shown in the wonderful message.
