HOME SERVICE CAMPAIGN IS ON

Thorough Canvass of City Will be Made by Officers in Charge of Raising Roseburg's Quota of \$1,000.

Captain H. Briggs who with his wife have charge of the local work of the Salvation Army, have received the endorsement of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce to conduct their annual home service campaign in the city of Roseburg. The captain is expecting reinforcements here tomorrow to assist in the raising of the desired amount, namely, \$1,000. The same plan of procedure will be followed as was followed last year, the local Salvationists endeavoring to secure the assistance of one or two of the leading business men of the city to accompany them on their rounds and introduce them to the business men of the community. In connection with the annual home service campaign now being conducted by the local Salvation Army officers, Mr. E. L. Graves, who is the state campaign director has worked out a schedule for the people to think about, which is as follows:

SHIPS WITH BOOZE TO BE EXCLUDED

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Announcement that the government in thirty days will begin to "vigorously" enforce the law as interpreted by the supreme court to prohibit American and foreign ships from carrying liquor within the three-mile limit was made tonight by Attorney General Daugherty.

Explaining that the supreme court mandate would become effective in 30 days, Mr. Daugherty in a formal statement, in which he discussed yesterday's decision at considerable length, declared that "every agency at any command will be used to enforce the law without favor, partiality or discrimination."

The liquor problem again became the paramount concern of the federal government today as a result of the decision of the supreme court drawing a prohibition dead line around the territory and territorial waters of the United States.

On the one side officials turned their attention searching to the question of what to do in the face of the court's ruling that outside the three mile dead line American ships can become under the present law as well as they desire.

On the other hand, there arose a new cause for international disagreement over the edict of the court that no foreign ship can bring liquors inside the three mile limit despite the fact that some foreign nations require their vessels by law to have liquor aboard and to serve it to their crews wherever they may be.

PUBLIC WILL SEE SHOW AT ARMORY
