ADVOCATES SHOE FACTORY IN PRISON

(By United Press.) TACOMA, May 2.—David J. Allen, representative of the department of Justice here inspecting the McNeil Island penitentiary, advocates the establishment of a shoe factory at the prison. Herbert H. Votaw, superintendent of prisons, and brother-in-law of President Harding, inspected the institution. Allen explains that the inmates of the shoe factory would be furnished to the federal government departments only.

(By United Press.) PORTLAND, May 2.—The first case of violence attributed to the I. W. W. strikers was reported when E. L. Benson, Beaver Creek logger, was found unconscious on West Park and Glean streets. Benson, who may lose his right eye, says he was attacked by a mob of fifty who were yelling "scab."

FAIR WEATHER IS PREDICTION MADE

PORTLAND, May 2.—The district weather office predicts fair weather, with frosts Wednesday night and Thursday in Oregon and Washington. JURY SELECTED FOR MURDER TRIAL

VANCOUVER, Wn., May 2.—A jury with five women, seven men and a woman alternate was sworn in today to try George Edward Whitfield charged with the murder of Anna Nesko, school girl, who was attacked and slain near Battleground on March 8th. Mrs. Paul Nesko again became hysterical in the courtroom and was led out screaming as she was yesterday. The jury was taken to the spot where the body was found and also shown the cabin where Whitfield was arrested.

SUSPECT ATTEMPTS TO ESCAPE JAIL

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, May 1.—The American woman who is held here by the police as Clara Phillips, the California banner murderer, attempted to escape from jail Sunday night with the assistance of several young students, the eldest sixteen

years of age. She managed to get into correspondence with the students, begging them to come for her and her sister at two o'clock Monday morning. The police learned of the plot and immediately began an investigation. They found a ladder close to the wall of the jail, which they alleged was intended for her escape. Fifteen students are under arrest charged with complicity in the plot.

The woman refuses to have photographs of herself taken, and declares that when she talks the American public will be started by her story. She asserts she is the victim of circumstances and keeps light spirited. Today she asked to consult a lawyer and demanded that her sister be released, as there is no charge against her and she has been in jail for 12 days, the lawful limit in Honduras being six days pending an investigation.

APRIL WAS VERY NORMAL MONTH

April was a very normal month in every particular, according to the monthly report of William Bell local weather observer. The month was two degrees warmer in temperature on a daily average, the normal being 51 degrees and the month's average 53 degrees. The highest temperature was 86 on the 15th and the lowest 35 on the 9th. There was a slight deficiency in precipitation, the amount recorded being 2.23 inches and the normal 2.48 inches. The rainfall was well distributed throughout the month, but there were several hours of sunshine on every day except the 3rd of the month, when the sun made his appearance for only twenty minutes.
