(International News Service.) ATLANTA, Ga., May 2.—Tapping his darkened way up the stone steps of police headquarters, E. W. Hazel, blind, every Saturday keeps an appointment with the law and his family. A woman waits him with a child in her arms. It is Hazel's baby son. The blind man takes the baby in his arms, a while, gently touches the baby face with fingers that must serve as eyes, then returns the child to his mother's arms.

Hazel told Municipal Judge Johnson that he could not live with his wife, but wanted to be with the baby at least once a week. Before he was blind he was out and back to his "stand" he does the probation officer in his eyes and dimes that have been dropped in his tin cup. The money helps support the baby.
