## COLLIE DOG GETS HELP FOR MASTER

The strange actions of a collie dog at the home of R. O. Goff, south of town last Thursday night, undoubtedly saved Mr. Goff, suffering from a broken pelvic bone and other severe injuries as a result of his horse falling on him, from spending a night on the mountain side without even a coat or other protection from the cold air, says the Sutherland Sun.

Mr. Goff left his home late in the afternoon to look after some sheep about two miles distant, accompanied by two collie dogs. On his return he had proceeded about a mile from the range when his horse stumbled and fell, Mr. Goff falling underneath. In attempting to arise, the animal fell over for a second time, again falling on Mr. Goff before he could change his position. In a second attempt to arise the animal succeeded, but Mr. Goff on attempting to regain his feet found that he was unable to do so. He was suffering much pain and realizing that he would be unable to regain the saddle and proceed home on his horse called one of the collie dogs to his side and tied a handkerchief to his neck, after which he sent the dog home.

The dog arrived at the Goff home about 9 o'clock in the evening, and after barking and whining at the door caused one of the members of the family to investigate. When the handkerchief was observed about the animal's neck, members of the family concluded that some mishap had overtaken Mr. Goff and a search was forthwith instituted.

It was very late into the night before Mr. Goff was finally located, through the barking of a dog which had remained with him. He was found a short distance from a mountain trail over a mile from his home, and it was with much difficulty that the searchers succeeded in getting him on his horse at his home, where a physician was summoned. An examination disclosed that he had sustained very severe bruises of both legs and his left arm. While no serious results are anticipated, it will be some time before he is again able to ride the range.
