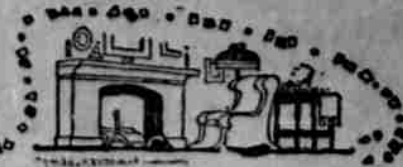

"Creating world friendships between children here and in foreign lands is the primary object. The children are organized in foreign lands also in fact it is compulsory in Poland that children belong to this organization. There are 250,000 in this organization in Czechoslovakia alone. The children exchange letters, pictures, and write about their country and its climate, crops, and so on, and in this way create a close bond of friendship that is bound to make itself felt in international affairs. The real worth of this work will be felt at its fullest extent in about the third generation, and is the only sure way of securing world peace."

Miss Holsinger went on to state that the Red Cross is of course not losing sight of the fact that the disabled soldier is the prime responsibility but that much of this work such as hospitalization and adjusted compensation has already been taken care of. There is to be a Regional conference of Western Oregon chapters in Salem on June 21, and several delegates are planning on attending from this city.
