SERIOUS CONDITION IN THE NEAR EAST

That a very serious condition prevails in the Near East as a result of a severe typhus epidemic, is the word received by Rev. L. B. Quick, in a telegram from J. J. Handsaker, state chairman of the Near East Relief committee for this state. The telegram says: "A cable just received tells of the deaths of thirty American native doctors and other relief workers as a result of the present typhus epidemic in Constantinople. The death rate among refugees is 300 daily. One hundred thousand Christians concentrated at Black Sea and Mediterranean ports are faithful unto death. Their only hope is America. We earnestly hope that your great church, again joyfully responds to Christ's appeal or many of these will die who might be saved."
