THE MONKEY WHO TURNED CAPITALIST

The Others Took to Socialism
and That Is How the
Fight Began.

Just because people hear the
term "high finance" so much, they
get the idea that the whole subject
of finance is over their heads. As
a matter of fact, it is right on a
level with their bread-baskets. It
has more to do with every-day
grub than anything else.

Finance has been described as
the art of applying money to prac-
tical ends. A man is a capitalist
when he accumulates enough mon-
ey, either out of his own savings
or by borrowing at interest the sav-
ings of others, to buy a farm or
build a factory, and begins manu-
facturing food or something else
he can sell to others at a profit.
That's finance. It sounds simple.
But I heard a story about a mon-
key the other day that made it
even simpler.

Far be it from me to make a
monkey of a capitalist—but this
was a very wise monk. He lived
in a zoo with a dozen various other
kinds of monkeys. Their food was
usually thrown in ready to eat and
each took his share. But one day
the keeper threw in some black
walnuts, hard as rocks. All the
monkeys vainly split their teeth on
them and they would have starved
as far as the results of their labors
went. But one of their number,

who was of a more intelligent spe-
cies than the rest, did some think-
ing. Then he accumulated a cou-
ple of rocks he found in the cage
and cracked the nuts between
them. He started a food factory.
HE WAS A CAPITALIST. He had
property that increased his ability
to produce food—that added to his
economic power.

But trouble began. The other
monkeys grabbed the kernels and
ate them up as fast as he knocked
them out of their shells. THEY
WERE SOCIALISTS. There were
other stones and they could have
cracked their own walnuts, but
they believed in dividing up share
and share alike what the Capitalist
produced. The Capitalist monkey
got so mad that he did the same
thing to their heads as he did to
the nuts. He cracked them. The
zoo keepers had to put the wise
monkey in a cage by himself to
prevent useless slaughter.

Human society handles a situa-
tion like this better. There are
those who don't want to work—
there are those who have not the
capacity to organize enterprise—
there are those who want more
than the share they earn—there
are those also who want an equal
division of wealth, and now and
then there is a rumour about it—
an outland strike or revolution or
something. But as a general thing,
the present social order fully pro-
tects the farmer and the manufac-
turer and other capitalists in their
property rights and enables them
to receive their just pay for what
they produce. It also provides a
reliable money system as a medi-
um by which fair exchanges of dif-
ferent products and services can
be made, and later on I will tell
you a story about that.

NEW STOCK GARDEN HOSE

PEN WARDEN TOLD TO HALT ESCAPES

SALEM, Or., May 7.—Four more
trusties "walked away" from the
state prison last night, and Gov-
ernor Pierce, because of the many es-
capes during the last four months,
tonight sent a letter to Johnson
Smith, warden of the institution,
ordering immediate steps to prevent
further breakes.

"It is, of course, my policy to save
all money possible at the peniten-
tiary," said the governor in his let-
ter to the warden. "I want the in-
mates of the institution to work so
far as possible in pursuits that will
afford a sufficient revenue to help
pay for the prisoners' keep. It is my
hope to make the penitentiary as
near self-sustaining as possible.

"However, I have not forgotten
that the penitentiary was built to
keep criminals away from society.
It is after all, a prison in which
men sent there are to be kept. Al-
though I am not greatly exercised
over the few escapes that have oc-
curred it is my judgment that it is
necessary for the warden to use
greater caution to the end that fur-
ther escapes will be eliminated.

"I, therefore, direct you imme-
diately to take whatever measures
are necessary to prevent further es-
capes from the Oregon state peni-
tentiary."

Records at the prison show that
18 men have escaped since January
1, when Warden Smith assumed
charge of the institution. Only six
of these convicts have been return-
ed, one of whom surrendered to of-
ficers in Portland.

The four convicts who left the
prison last night apparently tired of
their surroundings and "walked
away."

Three of the convicts, for whom
the officers are conducting a search
escaped from the penitentiary barn,
while the other man left the prison
wood camp near Marion. The names
of the convicts were given as Ed-
ward W. Jones, Albert Brownlee,
Ray Johnson and Dale Poynter.

Jones was received at the prison
from Klamath county and was un-
der two years' sentence for the
crime of larceny. He had been a
trusty for several months and re-
cently was assigned to employment
in the wood camp.

Brownlee came to the prison from
Deecheutes county following con-
viction on a charge of rape. He was
under eight years' sentence. Brown-
lee was employed as a teamster.

Johnson was committed to the
prison from Malheur county and was
serving six years for larceny of ani-
mals. He was employed in caring
for the horses at the prison barn.

Poynter was a one-year man and
came to the penitentiary from Har-
ney county. He was charged with
larceny. He also was employed at
the prison barn.

THREE BOY MURDERERS CONVICTED IN PRISON

BOSTON, May 7.—Three young
men, all serving life sentences for
murder in the state prison at
Charlestown, were confirmed in the
Episcopal faith by Bishop Charles
L. Slattery, of the Episcopal chapel.
The service was an intensely dra-
matic one as well as unusual in the
prison routine. The families of two
of the prisoners were seated in the
gallery during the ceremonies. About
150 fellow prisoners attended.

SOVIETS FINALLY INDUCE WOMEN TO BANISH VEILS

(By Associated Press.)
MOSCOW, May 7.—Communist
party workers say they now are at
last having some effect in their cam-
paign to modernize the Moslem wom-
en of the Near East.

It took hundreds of communist "mis-
sionaries" nearly two years in some
localities to persuade the women to
remove their veils and participate in
politics. Now, in Adjerbia alone,
however, more than 22,000 women
have been organized in industrial ac-
tivity, while workshops for feminine
Mohammedans, where they are taught
that the role of woman is far different
from that of the usual Moslem concep-
tion, have been established by hun-
dreds in Turkey, Iraq, Bokhara and else-
where.
