LABOR CONDITIONS SHOW IMPROVEMENT

LONDON, May 10.—The unemployment situation throughout the world is favorable compared with that of a year ago, says the current issue of the International Labor Review, the monthly publication of the International Labor office of the League of Nations at Geneva. The periodical has just finished a worldwide survey on unemployment.

In France and Belgium unemployment is almost non-existent. In North America employment was exceedingly good toward the close of 1922 as compared with 1921, though in Canada figures for October and November show a contraction as compared with previous years.

In the United States employment has been steadily increasing during the past year and business conditions continue to improve. Production was very good during January 1923, and apparently no one year has exceeded such a rapid recovery.

In the United Kingdom the general unemployment index numbers show little change at the end of January 1923 as compared with December 1922. The activity in coal mining, in steel-sheet manufacturers, and in the worsted industry was satisfactory, but most of the other principal industries are still under the spell of depression.

In the Scandinavian countries and in the Netherlands the situation shows improvement.

In Italy the great increase of the numbers of unemployed recorded at the end of the year was due to unemployment in the mining and outdoor industries, as well as in agriculture.

Polish industries were comparatively active during the last three months of 1922, and a comparison with the corresponding month of last year shows the unemployment has greatly diminished. In Switzerland unemployment is still declining.

Austria and Germany are the only two countries for which unemployment figures show a substantial increase at the end of 1922 as compared with 1921. It has been estimated that Austrian industries were working at 40 per cent of their capacity at the end of 1922. In Germany seasonal unemployment in the building industry is especially acute this year. Employment in the metal, electrical and chemical industries is still good, the decline being chiefly in the printing, food and building trades.

ASKS USE OF VACANT SCHOOLS TO PROMOTE SUMMER ART

NEW YORK, May 10.—(A. P.)—Community art centers in country school-houses deserted during the summer vacation period, are advocated by David Mannes, a musician of this city, who urges the organization of art clubs with headquarters in the empty school-houses for more widespread knowledge and enjoyment of art. Such centers, he says, would provide not only for the study of music, sculpture, painting, etc., but also give opportunities for wider companionship.

"Students and teachers in the cities would be glad to direct such clubs for a nominal sum during vacation time," Mr. Mannes declares. "Benefit would result to the children of farmers and country folk, and to the parents themselves, whose hunger for art goes unassisted. The development of the artistic impulse latent in everyone and stifled, too often, in those who are far away from the cities, is of great importance to America's intellectual advancement and spiritual growth."

WASHINGTON, May 10.—A conference by President Harding with some of his advisors within the past 24 hours resulted in a rearrangement of the executive's tentative speaking engagements on his western trip. The rearranged list provides addresses in St. Louis, Kansas City Mo., Hutchinson, Kansas, Denver, Salt Lake City, Boise, Helena, Seattle and three or four addresses in California, probably one each at San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego. He expects to sail for Alaska from Seattle. He will land at Portland on his return trip and proceed from there by train to San Diego.
