EMULATION IN INDUSTRY

In the old days on the farms, the help would rival each other in seeing which could mow the longest swath in the least time. Men in those days used to mark down in chalk on the walls of their workshops the big days' work they had performed, and efforts were constantly made to improve these records. Much use is made of this spirit of emulation nowadays in raising funds for philanthropic enterprises and civic projects. The workers are divided into rival teams, which vie with each other in intense competition to see which shall gain the most subscriptions. In modern industry there is a tendency for the day's work to be standardized, and capable men who show a tendency to speed ahead and to turn out a larger quantity, are cautioned by their comrades not to work too hard and set too fast a pace. Efficiency systems are looked at with suspicion by many, on the ground that they drive the worker and exhaust his vitality. There is such a thing as over speeding, and it is also harmful not to encourage men to do their best. It would seem as if competition, emulation, and rivalry, constitute an essential element in the progress of society, and they act as a stimulant to ambition. The people in any industry who put their brains into their work, in the effort to attain superior results, ought to be well rewarded therefore. Those who fail to make an earnest effort must expect to fall behind and can not expect standard rates of pay. Men and women were never meant to jog along in life without any goal of achievement.

Five new school houses being built in Klamath county this summer. Old Solomon Butte sawmill running and cutting 40,000 ft. a day.

New Bend woolen mill to start July 1st with 40 persons on the payroll.

Hills Creek sawmill, Lane county, cutting tim for Denver & Rio Grande Ry.

Oregon voter claims only one state has held down taxes as well as Oregon.

Silverton may get a new factory from Enterprise.

Warrenton—Second shift of 40 men added by Kelly Dumber Co. Ashland—Skyline mine shipping ore running \$100 to ton.

Bend starts \$200,000 street improvement program.

Forest Service lets \$366,335, contract for Eugene-Florence road. Belknap section McKenzie highway to macadamize 8 miles.

Corvallis—Contract let for \$25,000 addition to general hospital.

Pendleton—66,000 volt power line to cost \$350,000 being built from Pasco by Pacific Power & Light Company.

Salem—State prison brick yard operating—expect to make 3,000,000 brick.

Bell telephone Co. to spend \$1,800,000 on 50 Oregon projects.

Salem—Auburn district votes to build \$4,500 school.

Two referendum petitions have been filed against state income tax. Marshfield—Plans completed for \$50,000 bank building.

Wedderburn gets hard wood sawmill and tannic acid factory costing \$300,000 and which will employ 200 men and women.

Herwell Mineral Springs to have \$100,000 hotel.

Milwaukie to have \$5,000 school building.

Oregon has spent \$57,000,000 in five years on construction of roads.

Oregon City—Contract for new \$28,785 city hall awarded.

Roseburg—Good old showing in Sutherland well reported.

Marshfield—New city hall to be built at cost of approximately \$47,000.
