JAMES PINKERTON DIED SATURDAY

James McMillan Pinkerton, who died Saturday night, was born in Randolph county, Southern Illinois, May 4, 1849, the youngest of a family of six children none of whom survive him. He was married in 1874 to Nancy Boyd in Tilden, Randolph county, Illinois. Three sons and one daughter were born, the daughter dying in infancy and one son, Samuel Pinkerton, dying about six years ago. The family moved to the west in 1898 and settled near Oakville, Oregon, moving to Roseburg in 1917.

Mr. Pinkerton had a stroke Saturday night and passed away Sunday morning surrounded by members of his family and conscious to the end. His age was 74 years and 9 days.

The deceased is survived by his wife and two sons, John E. Pinkerton and James A. Pinkerton, and by five grandchildren. Mr. and Mrs. Pinkerton celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary two years ago last October. Mr. Pinkerton had led a very active life and insisted on being about on the ranch even though his strength had faded rapidly in the past few months. He was a man of sterling integrity, a devoted husband and loving father, a friend to be depended upon. By his consistent Christian life he has won a host of friends in every community in which he has made his home. The family have the sincere and heartfelt sympathy of all those that know them in this community. Mr. Pinkerton was for many years an officer in the United Presbyterian church upon moving to this city. The funeral was held at the Presbyterian church this afternoon at 2:30 p. m. with interment in the Masonic cemetery.

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HAYSEED FESTIVAL PLANNED BY LEGION

A "Hayseed Festival and Barn dance" will be the name of the big social event to be given by Umpqua Post of the American Legion at the armory on Wednesday night, May 23rd. The legion boys have been planning the festival for some weeks and preparations for it are now practically complete. The armory will be transformed into a massive barn with hay-ricks, haystacks, stalls, etc., much in evidence. The Umpqua Five orchestra, dolled up in strictly hay-rube fashion will provide a unique musical program for the evening.

Starting at 7:30 o'clock a vaudeville entertainment will be given. This entertainment under the supervision of Dee Mathews will last for one hour and will be followed by dancing. Posters advertising the affair are being sent broadcast over the entire county and it is expected that many outsiders will be here for the evening of fun. It is the first time in the history of the city that such an event has been staged and the vets are sparing no time and expense to make it a complete success. All of the vets and the auxiliary are going to be dressed "country style" and this will add much color to the evening. Further announcements concerning the big show will be made from time to time.

MUCH PRIZE MONEY FOR MEDFORD RACES

A two days' meet of automobile and motorcycle races will be held at Medford on June 15 and 16 under the auspices of the Jackson County Fair Association. Purse amounts to \$5,000 will be distributed among the winners. It is expected that entries will be made from points as far north as Roseburg and as far south as Yreka. Several cars will also be entered from Lakeview.

The main event on each day will be a 25-lap race for a purse of \$1,000. To date eight cars have been entered for this event; six from Medford, one from Roseburg and one from Grants Pass, but more entries are coming each day.

Five cars—Jewett, Essex, Hudson, Packard, and Studebaker—are entered in a 10-lap event for stock cars which will be held both days. One prize of \$200 is offered to the winner.

An eight lap motorcycle race will be on the program each day with one prize of \$300. Entries in this event have come from Portland, Salem and Eugene.

Another stunt for dealers is an obstacle race between a Ford, Chevrolet, Star and Overland. The cars will run 150 yards between barrels, chance rims in front of the grandstand and return the same distance between barrels, all against time. The purse is \$25.

The fifth item on the program will be a bicycle race of one lap for boys between the ages of 12 and 15 years. Three places will be counted and purses of \$25, \$10 and \$5 distributed among the winners. There will be no entrance fee for this event, but boys considering entering must see George Gates, race chairman, as soon as possible.

The capacity of the grandstand is being doubled and will accommodate 2,200. A caterpillar is at work putting the track in shape and it is expected to have the fastest mile and an eighth speedway in the northwest. It will be ready by June 1 for tryouts. After the large track is in shape, a half mile track will be constructed for horse racing at the County Fair in September.

FINDS MOON NOT SO FAR DISTANT

BOURGEOIS, France, May 14.—Prospective tourists to the moon may now make their plans.

Abbe Thomas Moreux, director of the famous Bourgeois Observatory, has just discovered, after many observations, that the moon is really a suburb of the earth. Instead of being 384,400 kilometers away the earth's satellite is really only 384,282 kilometers away. Abbe Moreux says. The trip to the moon is thus shortened by approximately 75 miles.

An aviator, flying at an average speed of 125 miles an hour and never stopping could reach the moon in 50 days of flying, Abbe Moreux says. Furthermore, a projectile fired into the air at an initial velocity of eight miles per second never will return to the earth and if projected in just the right direction, may reach the moon.
