MOVIES

"HUNTING BIG GAME" FILM SENSATIONAL

That attraction at the Lyric Theatre is an example of the cinema at its best. A more uniformly interesting and sensationally thrilling picture has not been shown on Broadway in the history of the theatre.

TOM WILSON'S CHARACTERIZATION SCREAM

For a powerful melodramatic picture "Quicksands" which comes to the Liberty theatre next Thursday and Friday, with a superb cast, including Helene Chadwick, Richard Dix, Alan Hale, Noah Berry, Walter Long, Dick Sutherland, and other notables, is unusually rich in comic incident.

Laughs are furnished by a negro regiment in general and by Sergeant Johnson (played by Tom Wilson) in particular. They are part of a troop of United States Cavalry stationed near the Mexican border, the commander of which keeps sharp lookout on a group of sinister men, most of them foreigners, who frequent a resort across the boundary and are suspected of smuggling narcotics into this country.

Directed by Jack Conway from a story by Howard Hawks, rare understanding of the negro, together with expert knowledge of how to project his peculiarities upon the screen, make "Quicksands" a picture decidedly out of the ordinary. Without burlesque or buffoonery the director has caught the spirit of the colored soldier and has made him an amusing figure not without sympathetic appeal.

"MOST HUMAN MOVING PICTURE I EVER SAW"

Montague Glass, creator of "Potash and Perlmutter," who put the finishing touches on the titles of "Hungry Hearts," a special production of Anita Yekker's story of New York life, which will be at the Antlers theatre for the last time tonight, wrote the following letter to the golden company immediately after he first saw the picture in preview:

"Hungry Hearts" is a picture which entirely disarms criticism. One might just as well try to criticize the technique of a mother nursing a child, or a bird singing, or any simple, natural beautiful thing. It was not like seeing a moving picture to me. It was like watching a business to be there, intruding myself upon the troubles of those kind-hearted, unfortunate Jewish people. I loved them all. I had sympathy for the hard-boiled landlord too. He seemed so profoundly, as for Sophia, the butcher—there are

hundreds of him, only not quite so natural—on every block in the Eighth Assembly District.

PATON AND MAYO IDEAL COMBINATION

A story of mystery in an older day that thrilled the readers of one of America's most popular magazines and was pronounced a top-notch work of fiction, comes to the Lyric theatre tonight in its screen form presented by Universal. "Wolf Law" was written by Hugh Pendexter. Charles Sarver prepared it in screen form for Stuart Paton to direct.

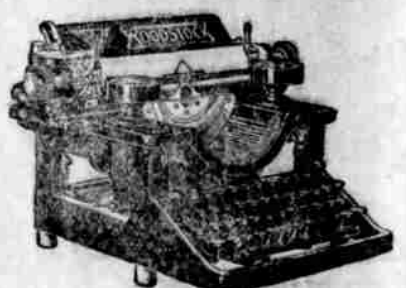
