The United States labor bureau is taking constructive steps toward bringing together the farm and the man looking for a job. It is an excellent idea and eliminates many abuses that have crept into professional employment agencies. It is to be hoped that this undertaking will prove a success at Salem and other points in the country where similar offices will be established.

PIERCE EXPECTED TO MAKE APPOINTMENTS

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—Persons in close touch with the administration said today that two important appointments probably will be announced by Governor Pierce this week. Although there has been considerable rivalry for the office of state highway commissioner to succeed Robert A. Booth of Eugene, the prediction was made today that this appointment will go to Wade Malone of Corvallis. Mr. Malone at one time served as county judge of Benton county and is a practical road builder. He is now engaged in the mercantile business at Corvallis.

It was announced definitely today that E. R. Bruce of La Grande will be appointed state industrial accident commissioner to succeed J. W. Ferguson. This appointment probably will be announced Monday or Tuesday, the governor said.

Mr. Bruce is a resident of La Grande, and until recently served as postmaster there. He is a democrat and has been a close friend of the governor for many years.

Although considerable pressure has been directed at the governor with relation to the removal of the heads of the various state institutions, it is not believed here that any change will be made along this line for at least several months.

DEMURRER ARGUED IN DAMAGE ACTION

A demurrer in the case of W. J. Moffitt, against the city of Roseburg was argued today before Circuit Judge Hamilton. This is a case in which Mr. Moffitt, who was employed by the Southern Pacific Company is seeking to recover damages for injuries sustained when he was crushed between an automobile and a city street intersection monument, while driving his motorcycle in course of duty. He alleges that the heavy monument was not in its right place and that as a result he sustained injuries for which he claims \$2,000.

Attorney Winberry representing the city, claimed that Moffitt had no right to be in his complaint the sum of \$2,000 for hospital fees, nurses and physician's charges. They were included, the city alleges, by the Southern Pacific company which collected dues from its employees for take paymen. Moffitt was out only the amount of his dues the city claims, and cannot expect reimbursement for something which he has not lost. His legal expenditure for hospital, nurses, etc., although the services might be worth the amount alleged, were only the amount of the dues paid by him and consequently that is all he can claim. The city's attorney contended the defense accepted the city's complaint in part and received a five day extension in which to file an amended complaint.

WARD DIVORCE CASE IS SETTLED TODAY

Decree Is Granted to Woman and Custody of Children Is Given to Maternal Grandparents—Financial Failure Blamed

A decree of divorce was granted today to Cora Emily Ward from Ray L. Ward, the custody of the minor children of the couple being given to the maternal grandparents. Because of the fight over the allegations in the case it has attracted considerable attention. Judge Hamilton has had the case under consideration for several weeks, and today handed down his decision.

He stated that the plaintiff sustained her allegations of cruel and inhuman treatment, and that the assaults made upon her by the defendant indicated an attitude of "domination by force." He stated that the case is a very unfortunate one, and due largely, apparently, to the fact that the young man has been a complete financial failure, in spite of the magnanimity of his father-in-law.

The plaintiff has shown marked faithfulness in her efforts to support the family by her work. Judge Hamilton stated, and although she undoubtedly was indiscreet in going to a dance and dinner with another man, the circumstances of the strained family relations should be considered. In providing for the future of the children, Judge Hamilton stated that they would be given a good home with their grandparents, and that they would always be well provided for. He ordered that the grandparents have the custody of the children and that the father be required to pay \$25 per month toward their upkeep and have the liberty of visiting them at all reasonable times.
