BIG POWER SYSTEM

RAN FRANCISCO, May 16. (UPI)—Through cooperation among the light and power companies of the west, one of the greatest systems of the country, extending from Albany, Oregon, to Tia Juana, Mexico, has been formed in the west. With but a few gaps, four comparatively small ones, a continuous line from Yuma, Arizona, taking in California points to Reno, Nevada, through Oregon, Puget Sound, and easterly to Billings, Montana, is formed by large power companies, according to the state railroad commission here.

The commission recently issued an order permitting construction of a line necessary to connect the Reno, Nevada, system with the Pacific Gas and Electric Co. The Truckee River Power Company furnishes Reno, Sparks, Virginia City and vicinity their power and lights.

The various lines in the big transmission system all buy and sell power. When one has a shortage it buys from its neighbor and if it has a surplus, sells, possibly to a company miles away.

The Albany, Oregon, to Tia Juana line is formed by connection of the

lines of Mountain States Power Co., operating in Central Oregon; the California Oregon Power Co., in Southern Oregon and northern California; Pacific Gas and Electric Co., in northern and central California; San Joaquin Light and Power Corp. in the San Joaquin valley; southern California Edison Co. in southern California; San Diego Consolidated Gas & Electric Co., whose lines reach to Tia Juana, and the Southern Sierra Power Co., whose lines reach the border at Mexicali.

STEEL BALLS USED IN GRINDING CEMENT

CHICAGO, May 16.—Just as iron gave way to steel a decade ago, now flint bows to the superiority of this competitor and steps gracefully out. Importation of flint pebbles from France and Denmark for use in industries dependent on fine grinding of rock, has practically been abandoned, due to the development of steel balls for this purpose, according to the Structural Materials Research Laboratories of Lewis Institute here. Some years ago there was a heavy demand for the flint stones, the bulk of which was obtained abroad.

These flint pebbles, according to the announcement, were used in the cement industry in the finer grinding operations, where limestones, shale and clay are reduced to fine powder. Preliminary crushing is done by a variety of methods, but the pulverizing was the work of the pebbles. Now steel balls are used. Long cylinders, known as ball or tube mills, are half filled with steel balls, and when the raw materials are put in, the cylinder is revolved. The balls climb the side of the cylinder and fall back on the raw material, pounding and rubbing it to powder. Some of the smaller machines will contain 10 or 11 tons of balls, while the largest ones need 34 to 38 tons. So thorough is the operation of the tube that the rock powder produced is finer than flour, and will pass through a sieve finer than silk. Similar machines are used in grinding the glass-hard clinker to finished cement, which must pass an equally fine sieve test.

Although some of the California mills still use flint pebbles, which are found in that state, the majority of the plants use steel balls, from 7-8 of an inch to five inches in diameter. Last year well over 25,000,000 tons of raw materials and 20,000,000 tons of clinker were pulverized by the cement industry in machines of this type.

PEOPLE TO REVISE COURSE OF STUDY

SALEM, May 15.—Revision of the courses of study of the elementary and grade schools of Oregon have been checked up directly to the people of the state by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction. The people will be asked to express their opinion as to the fads and frills in the present course of study and to designate just what studies should be eliminated and which should be retained in the new course.

This action on the part of Churchill follows the criticism which has been heaped upon the heads of the department of education because of alleged overcrowding of the present course of study which is said by many to be top heavy with unessential studies.

In order that the reaction of the general public to this task may be put to the best use in revamping the course of study G. A. Ager of Bend, president of the state teacher's association, has been asked by Churchill to name a committee to direct the survey and report at the meeting of the state teacher's association next December. This committee is composed of Dean E. D. Rensler of the Oregon Agricultural college, chairman; Professor F. L. Stetson, University of Oregon; President J. S. Landers, Oregon Normal school; Professor Frank Erickson, Willamette university; A. C. Strange, city superintendent of schools, Astoria; Hopkins Jenkins, principal Jefferson high school, Portland; Mrs. M. L. Fullerton, county superintendent of schools, Salem; H. E. Tatroe, The Dalles high school; Mrs. Inez Whittle, grade teacher, Persist, Jackson county.

NEED FOR ROADS IN ALASKA GREAT

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 16.—Owing to the failure of the parks department to make any provision for roads and to grant concessions for accommodations in Mount McKinley National Park, the Alaska road commission will be compelled to supply whatever facilities are available for tourists during the coming season. It has been announced here. These will be in the form of additional tents along the summit pack trail between McKinley station on the Alaska railroad and Kantishna.

Application was made recently by Woodrow Abey, who surveyed the boundaries of the park, for a hotel concession, but this was refused owing to lack of roads within the park.

The condition brings to light some of the problems confronting Colonel J. C. Steese in operating the Alaska railroad. As president of the Alaska Road Commission, Colonel Steese has had Major Gorwala in the field constructing wagon roads and trails into the Kantishna to serve the mining needs of this great lead-zinc-germanite district. It was hoped the parks department would be in a condition this season to have the road commission construct park roads in connection with the war department activities, but congress deleted the appropriation of \$750,000 from the budget and McKinley park is practically as primitive as it was in the beginning save for the trails necessary in making

the survey and crossing the park to the western interior.

Speaking of the park, Colonel Steese said all that could be done was for the Alaska road commission to establish additional tents in connection with its work and allow those touring the park to utilize these accommodations.

"I believe when the Brooklyn Eagle party arrives to dedicate the park," Colonel Steese said, "its members will grasp the full importance of the matter and be able to assist in getting congress to appropriate the necessary funds for the road."

The only transportation available in the park will be by pack train and as yet no large outfit have

been organized to care for travel. It will be possible for tourists in numbers to have the sleeping cars in McKinley

Observers of the government road are of the opinion the McKinley park should become a junct in combination with the Alaska Road commission and the entire matter of developing the road should be directed with a view to creating business for the rail project. While admitting that the matter could properly be handled by the Alaska Engineering Commission, Colonel Steese declared sponsor for the suggestion rather leaving it to be determined Washington, and taking no step until consultation.
