STEEL BALLS USED IN GRINDING CEMENT

(By Associated Press.)  
CHICAGO, May 16.—Just as iron gave way to steel a decade ago, now flint bows to the superiority of this competitor and steps gracefully out.

Importation of flint pebbles from France and Denmark for use in industries dependent on fine grinding of rock, has practically been abandoned, due to the development of steel balls for this purpose, according to the Structural Materials Research Laboratory of Lewis Institute here. Some years ago there was a heavy demand for the flint stones, the bulk of which was obtained abroad.

These flint pebbles, according to the announcement, were used in the cement industry in the finer grinding operations, where limestone, shale and clay are reduced to fine powder. Preliminary crushing is done by a variety of methods, but the pulverizing was the work of the pebbles. Now steel balls are used. Long cylinders, known as ball or tube mills, are half filled with steel balls, and when the raw materials are put in, the cylinder is revolved. The balls climb the side of the cylinder and fall back on the raw material, pounding and rubbing it to powder. Some of the smaller machines will contain 10 or 11 tons of balls, while the largest ones need 34 to 38 tons. So thorough is the operation of the tube that the rock powder produced is finer than flour, and will pass through a sieve finer than silk. Similar machines are used in grinding cement, which must pass an equally fine sieve test.

Although some of the California mills still use flint pebbles, which are found in that state, the majority of the plants use steel balls, from 7-9 of an inch to five inches in diameter. Last year well over 35,000,000 tons of raw materials and 20,000,000 tons of clinker were pulverized by the cement industry in machines of this type.

PEOPLE TO REVISE COURSE OF STUDY

SALEM, May 15.—Revision of the courses of study of the elementary and grade schools of Oregon have been checked up directly to the people of the state by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction. The people will be asked to express their opinion as to the facts and facts in the present course of study and to designate just what studies should be eliminated and which should be retained in the new course.

This action on the part of Churchill follows the criticism which has been heaped upon the heads of the department of education because of alleged overloading of the present course of study which is said by many to be too heavy with unessential studies.

In order that the reaction of the general public to this task may be put to the best use in reworking the course of study G. A. Ager of Bend, president of the state teachers' association, has been asked by Churchill to name a committee to direct the survey and report at the meeting of the state teachers' association next December. This committee is composed of Dean E. D. Rescher of the Oregon Agricultural college, chairman; Professor F. L. Stetson, University of Oregon; President J. S. Landers, Oregon Normal school; Professor Frank Erickson, Villamette university; A. C. Strange, city superintendent of schools, Astoria; Hopkin Jenkins, principal Jefferson high school, Portland; Mrs. M. L. Fulkerson, county superintendent of schools, Salem; B. E. Tatro, The Dalles high school; Mrs. Inez Willott, grade teacher, Forest, Jackson county.

OREGON CAVES OPEN FOR 1923 SEASON

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 15.—The Oregon caves will be opened to the public today for the 1923 tourist season although the buildings have not yet been completed for the housing and feeding of visitors. Guide service, however, is offered and will be maintained throughout the summer. Numerous parties already have visited the resort. Auto stages have been established to make daily trips to the resort, Cave day, when the formal opening is held, will not be set until late in June.

The automobile road to the caves is in excellent condition, the highway department having smoothed it and prepared it for the heavy travel which is expected this season. Last summer 10,000 tourists visited the caverns, located 56 miles from Grants Pass on the Grants Pass-Crescent City highway.

MUTE WOUNDED AFTER KNOCKING TO GET HELP

TILLAMOOK, Ore., May 15.—Rex Wynn, 36, deaf mute, is in the hospital here today suffering from a gunshot wound to his leg.

Wynn had lost his way late Saturday night while trying to find the home of some old friends. Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Kinnis, who live some distance outside of Tillamook, about midnight he approached the home of M. Tomlinson, a resident of the Peley creek district.

In response to Wynn's knocking on the door, Tomlinson called out "Who's there?" Wynn, unable to hear, continued to knock. Tomlinson told county officials who investigated the affair that, unlike a responder to his challenge, he got a 28 caliber rifle and fired twice through the door. After shooting Tomlinson says he was afraid to open the door and go outside.

Wynn, wounded in the leg by one of the bullets, and unable to make his hurt known to Tomlinson either, then he continued knocking, crashed away, reaching the home of his friends at four o'clock Sunday morning.

Speaking of the park Colonel Steese said all that could be done was for the Alaska Road commission to establish additional tents in connection with its work and allow those touring the park to utilize these accommodations.
