**ENGLISH JAILS OPEN FOR DELINQUENT TAXPAYERS**

(By Associated Press.)  
**LONDON, May 17.**—What happens to the people in England who do not pay their income-tax, has been told by an official of the Inland Revenue, who declares there are about 1,000 such delinquents now in jail compared with 1,162 two years ago.

Plenty of time is given by the authorities for payment, said this official, and in cases where it can be shown that funds are not available, easy methods are devised. In other cases, after a certain interval, a notice is sent to the defaulter that the tax must be remitted by a certain date—usually ten days' time. If that is disregarded a more urgent notice is sent, and three days' grace given. After that a distress warrant against the defaulter's goods is obtained. Those who are imprisoned for default are generally single, or have no seizable property of their own.

**LAUSANNE, May 17.**—The Greek delegates threaten to leave the Near East conference tomorrow unless the Turks forego the reparations claims. The Athens government also threatens to send troops across the Maritza river into the territory held by the Turks. The Balkan embrosio between Greece and Serbia against Turkey and Bulgaria is feared as it might precipitate a general European conflict.

**WASHINGTON, May 17.**—Alexander Hamilton's conception of financial integrity and sanctity of obligation was invoked as a remedy for the present world conditions by President Harding in an address today at the unveiling of the statue of the first secretary of treasury. Such principles as Hamilton followed, combined with "leadership which arises above prejudiced opinion, whether that prejudiced opinion had beginnings in war or is emphasized by geographical divisions," the president declared would turn humanity "to the rational and only way of restoration."

separate from the grade school events and the high school athletes will participate in the following: 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, 880 yard dash, one mile run, 220 yard low hurdles, discus throw, 12 pound shot put, running high jump, running broad jump, javin throw, pole vault, one-half mile relay race. The Roseburg schools which have an enrollment of more than two hundred pupils will be handicapped 20 points in order to give the smaller schools a better opportunity to win.

In addition to the track and field meet a literary or declamation contest is also given. Each district sends two contestants to this event and separate prizes are provided for boys and girls.

All school children that have won in the zone meets and are entitled to enter the events of the day are requested to be at the high school building by nine o'clock Friday morning to receive their entrance numbers. This is very important as there are some five hundred entrants listed and every event will need to be called promptly on time if the meet is completed.

The following are the chairmen of the groups for the day, and all children classified under each group must make themselves responsible to stay with the leader, otherwise if the event is called and they are not in their place they will lose the opportunity to enter.
