Panel's Interesting History.

A gruesome story attaches to a Flemish glass panel of the Four-teenth century, which was on exhibition in London, with other stained tion in London, with other stained glass work centuries old. On the panel is represented the suicide of Judas Iscariot, with vividity circumstantial and morbid details. In old books of the period reference is made to a glass painter, known as Charles of Ypres, who is known to have executed a great part of the most remarkable work of the time, having hanged himself to a tree. 
