The Legion "Flower Girls" will be on the streets on that day with the dainty flowers in baskets, and will accept each passerby. The flowers will sell for ten cents each, the large part of the funds raised to go to the disabled ex-soldiers in Portland hospitals to provide them with the comforts which they would otherwise have to go without. These boys made the flowers themselves with long hours of work, many times when in pain and suffering, and the least that anyone can do will be to wear one flower in memory of those maimed and crippled boys.

A shipment of 800 of the flowers will be sent here for the Legion Auxiliary to sell, and some will be sent to the small towns around the county. The flowers will also be sold in the theatre lobbies the evening of the 29th. Miss Gertrude Dolan and Mrs. Theodore Post have charge of the sale in this county.

MY FAVORITE RECIPE

Orange Cake

By Mrs. A. A. Wilder and Mrs. Tillie Johnson

1 1/2 cups sugar, and 1/2 cup butter. Cream well, and add yolks of 4 eggs, one at a time, stirring constantly. Then add following and beat for five minutes: 2 cups flour, 2 rounding teaspoons of baking powder, 1/2 scant cup water and orange juice, mixed, a little grated orange rind, whites of 4 eggs beaten to a froth. Bake in 2 layers and put together with powdered sugar icing, using orange juice, a little rind, and melted butter.
