PROSPECTS GOOD FOR BROCCOLI CROP

More broccoli than ever before in the history of the Umpqua Valley, will be planted this year and harvest next season. It was reported at a meeting of the members of the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange Thursday. The members received a report of this year's activities and were well pleased with the results. The season was very successful from every standpoint and the growers are well satisfied with the returns. Next year it is estimated that there will be around 1,500 acres in broccoli in this vicinity, or approximately 500 carloads. It was found that the incorporation papers of the exchange will not permit the organization to handle other products, but it is expected that some arrangements will be made whereby these crops can be handled. Foster Butler is now making a study of the situation and it is expected that arrangements for the marketing of fresh fruits and vegetables other than broccoli will be arranged outside of the broccoli exchange.
