**HEART FAILURE
CAUSES DEATH**

Reedsport Man Falls From Boat into River and Body is Not Recovered for Several Hours

REEDSPORT, May 21.—(Special to The News-Review.)—Charles Lawrence fell off a boat in the Umpqua river on Saturday night at 7 o'clock, while fishing on the river with his brother. He was standing up in the power boat and suddenly toppled over into the water and sank immediately. His brother, Eugene Lawrence, dove overboard as quickly as possible but was unable to find the body. He immediately called out the coast guard and with the help of numerous citizens the river was dragged until 11 o'clock at night, when the body was raised by Harry Marks. Lawrence was subject to heart spells and it is believed that death was caused by heart failure, as there was no water in the lungs to indicate drowning. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Lawrence, of Reedsport, and six brothers.

despite the rapid rate at which it was traveling and then jumped into the side car on Lillard's machine, both officers firing upon the fleeing car with the two men in the car firing in return. This running fight went on for two blocks, when the driver was hit in the wrist by one of the officers' bullets. This caused him to lose control of the car and it plunged around a corner and through a woodpile, coming to a halt in an alley. Both men jumped out and fled across lots, with Lillard and Dunlap in pursuit. Dunlap dropped before he had gone far from loss of blood and Lillard continued until he ran out of ammunition. He went back and obtained a rifle and returned to the house where he had last seen the fugitives. He was helped by Mrs. J. T. Salvage, who saw the men take cover beneath her house and called for the men to come out. This they refused to do, and he shot, wounding Parker in the right leg. The men were then brought out and taken to the hospital, where they received medical attention. It was found upon examining Parker that he was shot under the left shoulder and in the right leg. The shot in the right leg entered the leg in two places, and came out clean. The bullet first entered the thigh near the hip and went through, coming out on the underside of the man's leg and entered the calf near the ankle, coming out without touching the bone. Beckley was hit in the wrist, the bullet ranging down into his hand and lodging there, necessitating an X-ray to determine its exact location. He was also nicked just below the shoulder.
