PRUNE MEN TO HOLD MEETING

Umpqua Valley Growers to Send Delegate to Conference on June 5

DELEGATES CHOSEN

Growers to Meet in Roseburg on June 2 and Chose Man to Represent Unorganized Growers at Portland

The meeting of prune men held in the court house yesterday, resulted in a decision on the part of the Umpqua Valley growers to participate in the conference to be held in Portland on June 5 to determine if possible some means of disposing of the existing surplus of prunes in this state.

It was held necessary that some concerted action be taken to formulate a state selling agency which will get the Oregon prunes on the market and see that they are disposed of at favorable prices before the oncoming crop is ready for market.

Several plans were discussed but as any action must include the entire state a more specific conference was deemed necessary. Consequently it was decided to appoint a number of delegates from each part of the county to meet in Roseburg on June 2. These delegates will then select one willing representative who will represent the growers in the conference at Portland on June 5. An advisory committee will also be chosen to consult with the representative and to look after the interests of the unorganized growers of the vicinity. Each packer and organization will also be represented at the Portland conference and at that time it is expected that some definite plan will be materialized.

The growers who will meet here on June 2, are George Netter, R. R. Clarke, W. W. Cardwell, L. V. Emery, George Bacon, A. C. Marston, J. H. Routh, J. M. Thorne, M. E. Green, Harry Winston, C. E. Hatfield, R. M. Keith.

TO FILM ALASKAN RAILROAD ROMANCE

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 24.—A film location that will become history in connection with the construction of the Alaska railroad was made recently by an Alaska motion picture corporation when, with several hundred seasoned Alaskans, including many who had blazed the first trail over the Spencer divide at the head of Turnagain Arm and picked their way over the treacherous crevasses of Spencer glacier, reenacting the various roles.

Aside from its value as a sequence in a romance of the north, the film will give to the outside world some idea of the herculean task confronting the engineers who conquered the obstacle and blasted the road-bed from the living rock.

In order to show the most minute detail of actual life on the trail when strong men battle against scorching sun, the howling blizzards, the isolation, farther and farther into the wilderness, many seasoned Alaskans of the days of 1897 have volunteered to assist the cameramen in their work.

As yet the monetary element has not entered into the labors of these pioneers, a sort of home pride prompting them to contribute to correct historical detail. The value of this service to motion picture makers is beyond computation in point of correct props, such as costumes, dog teams, pack animals, bivouacs in the snow and every essential calculated to give to the world a correct reproduction of the historical scenes attendant upon the conquest of Alaska.

Through the labors of Alaska pioneers, the motion picture men have been able to bring to their aid correct settings and reproductions of the wild scenes of hunting and dance hall, things considered essential in the days when there was neither "law of God or man north of sixty-three."

Now stand and departmental organized veterans of the gold stampede days are found ready to step forward and take charge of various scenes and direct them just as they were enacted in the Dawson days. The fly in the ointment is the absence of something warm in the blood to assist in the spirit of the occasion.

In sponsoring the reproduction of the heroic scenes the pioneers have in view the presenting of contrasts between Alaska of those days and the present, when the conventions are more strict than in most older communities.

BREAK IS EXPECTED

LONDON, May 24.—A break between the Greeks and Turks is hourly expected at Lausanne where the Near East conference trembles on the brink of a precipice. Possibilities dispatches say that the Greek government rejected a compromise from Vassalos, the Greek representative accepted with the situation the tensest. The Greeks claim that an entire Turkish division crossed Thrace ready for hostilities.

TROOPS AFTER BANDITS

PEKIN, May 24.—A crack division of the Shantung troops is marching toward the bandit stronghold where the Americans and other foreigners are held hostages. The sudden military action is without explanation from military sources. It is assumed that fresh troops are replacing those besieging the brigands in preparation for pushing an offensive against them. It is expected that this is the result of the worse treatment of the prisoners.

UMPUQUA BAPTISTS TO MEET AT EUGENE

EUGENE, May 24.—Representatives of churches all over Lane, Douglas and Clatsop counties will meet here for a two day session of the Umpqua Baptist Association. He closed by 12 congregations, to be held this year in the First Baptist church here from May 24, it is learned from Rev. Charles E. Dunham, chairman of the committee to meet here at 11 o'clock Friday morning to make the schedule of addresses and arrange preliminaries for the entertainment of this community besides the Dunham are Rev. T. H. Moore of Jackson City, Rev. Alford Woodman of Veneta, Rev. Edgar R. Fisher of Portland and Rev. J. M. R. of Coquille.

Besides members of the 15 congregations included each will have a representative number of delegates from the list of the church to be present here, with all and two representatives for the first hundred members additional. Several state leaders of the Baptist church will be present on the program with local workers.

TEGUGGALIA, May 22.—Clara Phillips, Los Angeles "hammer murderess," enroute to the United States is guarded closely by under-sheriff Escalante, detective and matron. With a woman companion, said to be her sister, she was removed from the cell and the journey started. Secrecy is being used due to fear of an attempted rescue. Jesse Carson, the man who posed as her husband, remained in the national penitentiary pending thorough investigation of the charges that he planned a revolution to overthrow the government and make himself and Mrs. Phillips joint dictators.

FOREST EXAMINER JACKSON KILLED

Word was received here today of the death of Forest Examiner C. W. Jackson, formerly of Canyonville, who was killed yesterday while employed on the Colville National forest, to which he was transferred recently. Mr. Jackson was formerly a scaler at Rulands and later a ranger at Tiller. He was recently transferred to the Colville National forest and was stationed at Republic, Washington. According to the meagre details received, he was killed when a White truck, in which he was carrying supplies, went over the grade near Cascade, B. C.

He leaves a father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. George Jackson, who reside at Canyonville, and a wife and two children. The children are now visiting with relatives in California. They are 13 and 6 years of age.

Mr. Jackson was a native of this state and was born in 1873. He was affiliated with both the Masonic and I. O. O. F. orders. The body is to be brought back to Canyonville for burial.
