PORTLAND WOMAN IS ELECTED PRESIDENT

MEDFORD, Ore., May 24.—The an-
nual election of officers at the clos-
ing session this afternoon of the
Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs was
marked by some bitter feeling that
has been smoldering during the con-
vention and which broke out into a
row.

Following the election and install-
ing of new officers, with convention
wounds patched up, on the surface at
least, most of the delegates began
leaving for their homes in various
parts of the state.

Two hundred and fifty-one votes
were cast at the election, which re-
sulted as follows:

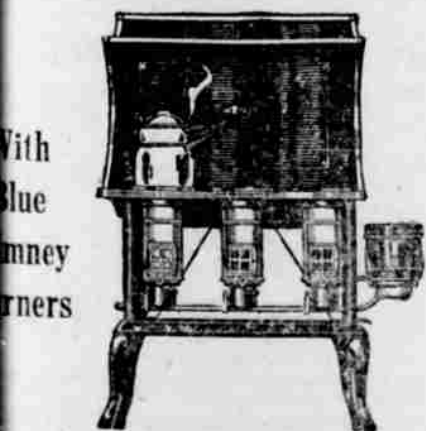

SIGNALMEN ASK FOR BIG WAGE INCREASE

(By United Press.)
CHICAGO, May 25.—Fifteen
thousand members of the Broth-
erhood of Railway Signalmen
have asked 25 railroads to re-
store the former's wartime
wages. D. W. Holt, president of
the union, announced late today.
An increase of twelve to thirty
cents would cost the roads
four and one-half millions. The
plan is based on the increased
cost of living. At the same time
the railroad labor board re-
ceived word that six eastern
roads had increased the pay of
27,000 maintenance of way work-
ers from one to three cents an
hour.

ATTORNEY INDICTED ON FORGERY CHARGE

An indictment was returned
late yesterday evening by the
grand jury against Attorney
O. S. Brown with recently a
resident of Glendale, Brown is
charged with having forged the
name of a client to a real bill,
the document having been pre-
sented in justice court of the
Cov Creek district presided
over by Justice of the Peace J.
B. Pickett.
The case was one in which
Attorney Brown represented
firm of Clark and Dewey,
the plaintiffs being A. J. Clark
and J. C. Dewey. Following the
case a real bill setting forth a
claim for \$200.00 was present-
ed and it is alleged by the state
that the name of Mr. Clark
stamped to the paper was writ-
ten by his attorney, constitu-
ent in a forgery.
Attorney Brown was arraign-
ed this morning at 10 o'clock
and entered a plea of not
guilty. His case will probably
come before the jury next Tues-
day.

men to work with open fresh air and
wholesome food. We therefore sug-
gest that arrangements be made by
the county court and the sheriff given
instructions to work these men in
that manner. If for any reason the
county should not desire to make the
expenditure to furnish the proper
equipment, then we most certainly
recommend and suggest that it in-
struct the sheriff at once to work
these men on the highways or pro-
vide a place where they might work.
This can be done without the expendi-
ture of any money and it would be
far better for the health of the pris-
oners who are confined to be out in
the open air required to work for
exercise than to be allowed to spend
their entire time in the filthy jail.

We have also inspected the Court
House and, while we find the same in
a deplorable condition, we understand
that the recommendations of the com-
mittee recently appointed by the dif-
ferent organizations to investigate the
matter of the construction of a court
house are for a new structure, yet
we believe, notwithstanding that fact,
that it is absolutely imperative that
some minor improvements be made at
once by the court. Some kalsomining
should be done and, as far as possible,
some of the fire hazards removed by
taking down the stove pipes and clean-
ing them and seeing that they are
properly jointed together before an-
other winter, and also by cleaning up
the garret and a few other places that
now present the appearance of a
genuine fire hazard.

The treasurer's office is overcrowd-
ed and a small outlay will give him
more room and permit him to properly
discharge his duties. There is no
reason why the broken window panes
which present such an unsightly ap-
pearance to the general public should
not be replaced, and someone should
be instructed that when a window
light is broken it should be replaced.

We wish further to state that we
visited the county Poor Farm and in-
vestigated and examined the conduct
of the same, and we wish to state
that we found the same kept in a
clean and sanitary condition and the
inmates thereof provided with proper
nourishment and wholesome food. We
find however, that several improve-
ments should be made as the property
is deteriorating. The walls of the
building need kalsomining and the
various pipes of the heating plant are
becoming unwrapped and show fast
deterioration. These pipes should be
wrapped and tested so that the heat
will reach the upstairs which under
present conditions is not fully sup-
plied with the necessary warmth dur-
ing cold weather. The smoke-house
used in connection with the farm is
inadequate and it should be enlarged
or replaced by one of sufficient size
and capacity to take care of the de-
mands of the institution.

We further wish to state that the
grand jury preceding us recommended
to the county court that they provide
said farm with a hydraulic ram and
pump of sufficient capacity to irrigate
that part of the farm devoted to truck
garden and also that certain fruit
trees be planted. We do not know
whether this recommendation has
been taken seriously by the court or
complied with, but we wish to state
that this recommendation meets with
our hearty accord and if this has not
been provided for it should be done at
once. We feel that it should be the
duty of the court to keep the poor
farm in good condition. It should not
be necessary for the grand jury at
each term to make recommendations.
The poor farm should be run on a
business basis and it should be kept
up at all times. Our attention also is
called to the fact that the building is
not provided with fire escapes. We
do not wish to dictate to the court,
but if the law requires it the building
should be equipped with fire escapes.

We wish to call attention to a part
of the building, particularly the en-
try to the front door, which is sagging
and lowering and should have im-
mediate attention. The superintendent
should have power, without any un-
necessary red tape, to make these im-
provements and keep the building in
proper condition.

Having completed our labors, we re-
spectfully request to be relieved from
further duties in connection therewith.
