SUPPORT GIVEN MILITARY CAMP

Mayor Rice Endorses Citizens' Military Camp to Be Held at Camp Lewis Starting July 26—Nathan Fullerton Chairman

Along with other mayors of cities and towns of the northwest, Mayor N. Rice has given official endorsement to the Citizens' Military Training Camp, to be held at Camp Lewis from July 26 to August 24. Several mayors have issued proclamations declaring the advantages of the camp and giving hearty support to the plan.

At these camps citizens are given an intensive course in military training for a period of one month. They are taught the first principles of military training and after the course are in a position to be better able to serve their country in time of need and at the same time have given themselves an enjoyable vacation and outing.

Recognizing the fact that many of the citizen student soldiers are taking their vacation simultaneously with the training, the government provides a great deal of entertainment, and students at the camp enjoy a delightful time together with the experience of army life.

The camps are especially good for young men who have had no military experience or training. The young man acquires a greater ability to care for himself. He undergoes a training in discipline that will be of untold value to himself in later years. He learns self reliance and obtains a confidence in his own ability, that he would not otherwise obtain. At the same time he is greatly benefited in health by the regular hours, the outdoor life, and the exercise provided by army training.

Oregon is behind Washington in the number of recruits for the summer camp and an effort is being made to secure more recruits from the state. The camp is conducted by the government and all expenses are paid so that there is absolutely no cost, even the cost of transportation being handled by the government, which provides for railroad travel and all meals and other expenses.

The American Legion post here has also given endorsement to the camp and Nathan Fullerton, a member of the local post, has been made chairman of the committee. He has all information concerning the camp and anyone interested can obtain application blanks and data from him.

SHERIFF'S SLAYER IS FORMER CONVICT

PORTLAND, May 25.—(By A. P.)—Detective Patrick Maloney, identification expert of the Portland police, who visited Albany yesterday as a representative of the police department at the funeral of Sheriff Dunlap, announced today that he had identified Art Heckley, driver of the car in which Dunlap was shot as Eddie Johnson, automobile thief who had served time in the reformatory at Monroe, Wash.; who escaped from Colorado state prison, and who had been arrested here once on a Chicago larceny charge upon which Illinois authorities failed to extradite him. The identification of Parker has not yet been made.

May Be Bank Robber
ALBANY, May 24.—District Attorney L. G. Lewelling this afternoon stated that he is convinced Johnson and Parker may have staged the Wilsonville bank robbery for the reason that Johnson had on his person a coin wrapper. The district attorney has asked one of the bank officials to come here today and identify the wrapper.

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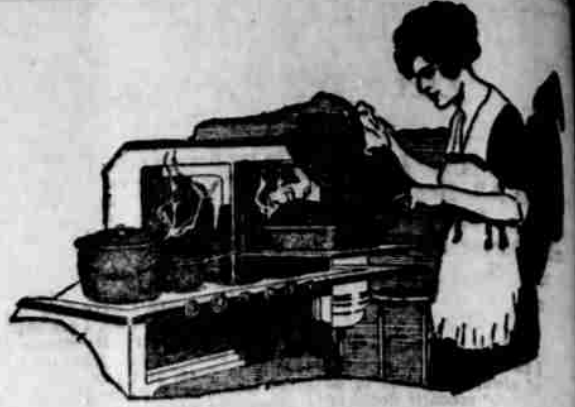
