ANSWER FILED IN KUFNER LAW SUIT

SALEM, May 28.—The answer of A. G. Kufner and Nora M. Kufner his wife, in the action brought by the State Bank of Riddle against A. G. Kufner and several others to collect on a promissory note for \$1537, filed in circuit court today declares among other things that Peter Kufner, one of the defendants filed the state to avoid creditors and gave power of attorney to his wife, Maria Kufner.

This is the case in which Maria Kufner made sensational allegations against Ronald G. Glover, well known local attorney, who is one of the attorneys filing the answer today. Glover had issued a statement denying these allegations in their entirety.

In the answer today it is declared that a number of the defendants entered into the lumber business in partnership and formed the Kufner-Cranston Lumber company at Riddle. In 1921, the answer states, the lumber market took a slump and the company was compelled to borrow heavily. Because of the involved situation growing out of a borrowing transaction, the answer asserts that Peter Kufner left the state "to avoid the plaintiff and other creditors," gave power of attorney to his wife, Maria Kufner. After numerous conferences, states the answer it resulted in execution and delivery of a note and mortgage as consideration for the cancellation of notes of Peter and A. G. Kufner.

A. G. Kufner and his wife in the answer declare they should not be compelled to pay more than half of the note, the costs, interest and attorneys' fees, and therefore tender \$2000 into court to pay such half and ask dismissal of the action as to them.

SCHOOL HAS CLERK BUT NO PUPILS

SALEM, May 28.—Sam Hill of Abiqua Heights, above Scotts Mills, came into Salem with a problem yesterday.

He is clerk of the school district in that section, and the district owns a fine schoolhouse there, modern in every respect, finely equipped and with numerous facilities not found in all country school districts.

The only thing that the schoolhouse and the district lacks are pupils and parents.

In June there is to be an annual meeting of the school district, but Sam Hill is the only man who lives in the district, there being no men or women outside of Sam—and he is a bachelor—there are no children, and so last year there was no school.

There are 12,000 in bonds against the district and how to keep things going with a new set of officers when there is no one to elect officers, is the problem confronting Sam. He is doubly loyal to the district, as he contemplates moving up to Hood River himself unless he changes his mind, and he hates to leave the schoolhouse with no district, no officers, nothing but emptiness and the weeds growing up and the schoolhouse going to rot. He takes care of the grounds, keeps watch and ward over the school and handles the situation generally.

INDIANS TO SEE FIGHT AT SHELBY

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28.—Thousands of the nation's sporting fraternity will travel to the Shelby fight arena on palatial special trains. Other thousands will go by automobile. Same, no doubt, will "ride the rods" and still others will walk. But the whole tribe of the Blackfoot Indians of the Glacier National Park Reservation will be there with a whoop "on the hoof" if Uncle Sam does not interfere with plans laid at a recent pow wow.

The Blackfoot braves' program will add a dash of color and action to the picturesque flood of humanity that pours into the arena on the Montana prairie Independence Day, unless the Interior Department raises a personal liberty question against the government's charges and issues a "blanket" order putting a ban on the activities of these Indians from the reservation.

With the scene of the battle of the two great pale face "chiefs" only sixty miles away from the boundary of the reservation the red men's sporting blood is purging. They will hop on their ponies before break of day and ride to the ring in ample time to see the big "hand to hand" encounter.

If an adverse ruling is made by the Indian department here in Washington it may become necessary to throw a large cordon of mounted Indian Police around the eastern edge of the reservation to keep the Indians from slipping out in large numbers, so determined are they to "hit the warpath trail" to the white man's battle ground.

Just what action will be taken, if any, has not been announced, but it is understood Supt. Campbell, who is in charge of the Glacier National Park reservation with headquarters in Browning, Mont., soon will be given sealed orders as to just what Uncle Sam's moral attitude is in the matter of his copper-colored nephews attending a pale face prize fight.
