ICE IN IDAHO MEET JUNE 18

POCATELLO, Idaho, May 28. (A. P.)—Hearing by the Interstate Commerce Commission to investigate alleged failure of transportation companies to furnish adequate facilities for removing raw products from the northwestern states during 1922 will be held here June 18, according to announcement.

The federal commission has instituted the case on its own initiative, and it is believed, will give special attention to the phases of the question applying to the transportation of agricultural products and lumber from the northwest. Following the Pocatello hearing, the federal commission will hold a general inquiry at Seattle in July.

The local hearing will be presided over by Clyde H. Atchison, commissioner, it was announced.

TRAINING CAMP
HEAD IS HERECol. Witworth, Commanding
Officer of Citizens' Camp,
Spends Day in Roseburg

ATTENDANCE IS URGED

Many Forces Work Against
Camp, Army Officer States
—Opportunity Afforded
Young Men to Learn

Col. P. Whitworth, chief of staff of the 56th reserve division, arrived in Roseburg today to spend a short time in the interest of the Citizens' Military Training Camp to be held at Camp Lewis in the near future. Col. Whitworth will be the commanding officer of that camp and states that plans have been made for a very good course this year. An effort is being made to interest more young men in this camp as it is an excellent opportunity to obtain a summer's outing without cost and at the same time receive valuable military training which will be of great use throughout future life.

"There is a great deal of antagonistic influence to the camp this year," Col. Whitworth said today. "Pacifists and Red propagandists realize that the Citizens' Military Training camp is a great feature in maintaining a strong arm of defense for our country."

"The most of us realize that the United States should be reasonably prepared for war. Preparedness is nothing more or less than insurance. We want no big standing armies, to create a great expense and neither do we want a military system of government or a system of training to make our country militaristic in character. However, we do need a foundation of men physically qualified and trained in the fundamentals of military tactics to fall back upon in cases of emergency."

"At the present time we have a great reserve system which will be a wonderful force for our country. This reserve is composed of officers and men who have had service in the late war. They are organized and trained and in a short time can rally to the defense of the country. We cannot, however, depend upon these men for all future time. As they leave the reserve we must replace them with younger men. These men will come from the Citizens' Military Training Camps and from the National Guard."

"It is not to be understood, however, that any citizen by attending these training camps, is obligated to take up arms in defense of his country by such attendance. Persons attending camps are not enlisted and are not obligated in any way. Upon their return home they resume their former status and are in no manner connected with any of the armed forces of the government and are subject to service only as any other citizens of the country."

"These camps offer young men an opportunity to obtain knowledge regarding the fundamentals of military operations. They are given the marching, facing, squad drill and other training, are instructed in hygiene, sanitation, etc., and are given physical training which will put them in fine condition. Demonstrations by the various departments of the military organization are held so that a young man may see exactly the work of each branch. If he returns the second year, he may enter any one of these branches which he desires and receive training in that particular department."

"The men are instructed regarding their duties as citizens and return with a higher sense of their obligations to their country, state and community."

Col. Whitworth states that the government furnishes transportation to and from camp, provides uniforms, meals, etc., to all applicants. No costs are attached to the camp except what the recruit desires to spend upon himself for recreation. The government will either provide the applicant with a railroad ticket for his transportation, or will pay him upon his arrival and departure at the rate of 5 cents per mile. The training camp plan has been given the endorsement of Umpqua Post of the American Legion and also has the approval of Mayor N. Rice, Nathan Fullerton, of the Rexall Drug Store is in charge of the committee handling applications from this county and has all information and blanks necessary to secure admission to camp and will advise all those who are interested. Donahoe county has a quota of eight and it is desired to secure more than that number if possible.

IS OUT OF POLITICS

PORTLAND, May 28.—The Ku Klux Klan in Oregon will withdraw from political activities—except in the matter of supporting legislative measures which are pro-Protestant—and will function in future closely along lines that are purely fraternal with "better Americanism" as the foundation of the ritual.

"The religious and racial fight is over, so far as the Klan is concerned, and unless the other side brings it to us, we will have none of it. We will remain pro-Protestant, as we have always been, but we will not be actively anti-Catholic, anti-Jewish or anti-anything racial or religious."

This announcement was made in an interview with Fred L. Gifford, Saturday afternoon, at which time he announced his appointment as imperial representative, with control of all the territory west of the Rocky mountains and outlined the future policy of the organization.

"We are going to devote our time to developing along the lines of Americanism, tolerance and liberalism," Mr. Gifford said.

"Local Klan organizations will not be permitted to have lectures given which are unauthorized by the imperial palace, and all of the lectures will be handled by the national organization."

"There will be no more anti-Catholic, anti-Jewish or anti-racial lectures permitted."

"The white mask will be retained. I am one of the principal remaining boosters for its retention, by the way—but it will be retained only as a lodge room regalia."

"The symbolism of the Klan is vitally bound up in this regalia and for that reason I do not believe it should be abandoned from the ritual of the fraternity."

"It cannot be used outside the lodge, however, under any circumstances, and will remain in charge of a custodian who has no authority to let it be taken from the lodge rooms."

"Any man who appears in future wearing Klan regalia outside the lodge, except in case of formal public function of the lodge, either will have stolen it or will be wearing it not as a klanman."

"Under the Clarke regime many things crept in that have caused the Klan to be looked upon with suspicion and have aroused animosity in many places. Now that Clarke has been eliminated—after having exploited the organization for his own benefit and aggrandizement, regardless of its principals and purposes—the organization will take positive steps to wipe out the effects of many of the things that arose under that regime."

An arrangement is made by which she returns to her parents, the husband often paying compensation to the father. The same woman will probably soon be married again to another Moor, and will take it all as a matter of course.

Moorish weddings are very interesting affairs. The actual ceremony takes place at midnight, but the celebration lasts for some days, particularly in the case of the better class of Moors. The festivities take the form of much feasting, dancing, music and the firing of salutes from the long native rifles. Friends come from all the surrounding districts, rigged out in their brightest and best attire.
