FIVE TRAINS WILL MOVE GUARD TO CAMP

Schedule Prepared for Departure of
National Guard Troops to Summer
Camp During the Latter
Part of June.

SALEM, May 29.—Five special trains will carry the units of the Oregon National guard troops to the two weeks camp of field instruction to be held during the latter part of June, according to the detailed arrangements of schedules as made up under a special authority of the quartermaster general of the army, and just made public by Adjutant General George A. White. Sleepers will be provided for the guard members where they have to travel during the night in order to reach camp. Special freight trains bearing baggage and other equipment will precede the regular troop trains.

Entrainment for Camp Lewis will be made on Saturday, June 16. On June 15 guard members from southern Oregon will leave for Portland, from where the special trains will leave. Troops from Medford, Roseburg, Cottage Grove, and Eugene, will leave on June 16 for Portland, traveling in special sleepers attached to regular trains. Willamette valley units from Corvallis, Dallas and McMinnville, will leave late Friday afternoon, June 15, for Portland and spend the night at the armory there.

Tillamook guardsmen will be taken to Portland on a special which will arrive in Portland in the early morning. It is said that this will be the first sleeper train ever taken out of Tillamook.

The first train leaving Portland will pull out at 7:45 a. m. on June 16 bearing battery A with a large amount of equipment. A second train will leave at 9 a. m. Carrying Portland units of the 162nd infantry, the Portland and Hood River units of the 18th infantry, and company A, 118th engineers. The third train will leave 45 minutes later carrying units of the 162nd and 18th infantry regiments from Gresham, Eugene, Medford, Cottage Grove, McMinnville, Silverton, Tillamook, Dallas and Corvallis.

Hospital company 167, Lebanon, may be authorized to proceed overland to Camp Lewis with ambulances and trucks.

Ashland will be the gathering point for the coast artillery units which are to go to Fort Barry, California. Organizations from Salem, Albany, Newport, Toledo and Marshfield will leave on special sleepers on June 17, consolidating into one big train at Ashland. They will spend Wednesday, June 18, in Ashland attending a big celebration after which they will have for California.

ELECTRICAL EXPERTS TO MEET IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, May 29.—(A. P.)—Farm electrification and the further electrification of American industries and commerce, as a means of offsetting farm labor shortages and the growing scarcity of labor resulting from prosperity coupled with restricted immigration, will be two of the many subjects coming before the forty-sixth convention of the National Electric Light Association in New York City June 4 to 8.

Progress in electrical science, re-

search, invention and physical development also will be outlined in the reports to be presented and the discussions which will follow their presentation.

Electrical experts from all over the United States and its territorial possessions, from Canada and from foreign countries will participate in the program. Those present will include Thomas A. Edison, the father of the industry in this country, and Dr. Steinhilber, the "Wizard of Schenectady."

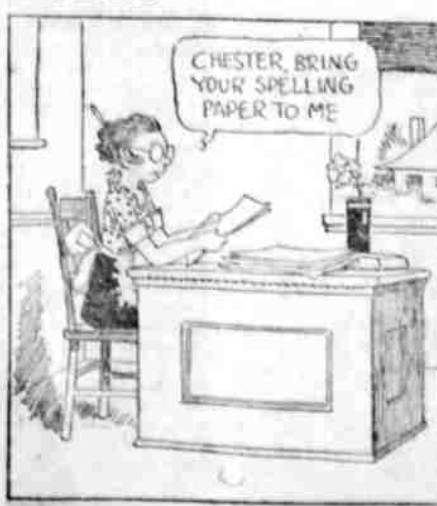

VANCOUVER BODY TO TEST ALLEGED CURES OF HEALER

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 29.—(U. N. S.)—Investigation of cures claimed by the Rev. C. S. Price, divine healer-evangelist, whose campaign concluding tomorrow, has drawn 100,000 persons to the arena in 10 days, will be made here by a committee comprising ministers, doctors, laymen, says the general ministerial association. Three university professors will be among the examiners.

Price's experiences and activities at Lodi, California, and Albany, Ore., will also be reported.

As in Victoria, B. C., Albany and elsewhere on the Pacific coast, the religious life of Vancouver is sharply split on whether Price is endowed with the gift claimed to impart Christ's healing power or whether he is a super-hypnotist.

It is noted that cripples and wheel chair cases were left until last night the last healing night of the campaign, when some swooned, but little effects were physically shown. Six hundred were laid out unconscious last night.

PIERCE IS WEAVING STATE JOB HOLDERS

CORVALLIS, May 28.—Governor Pierce was the guest of honor at a meeting of the American Association of Civil Engineers and the state highway engineers Saturday, at which 159 of the leading engineers and army officers of the state were present.

"I have to pinch myself every time these honors are accorded me," declared the governor as the assembly arose to greet him. "Only a few months ago I was riding the range in Eastern Oregon." The governor told of the numerous job hunters in Salem.

"Remember I am weaving them away from state jobs over at Salem, just as I used to do my calves in Eastern Oregon," he said. "So if you hear any noise you'll know it is some of them who are afraid they must get their living away from a state job."

President W. J. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college, delivered the address of welcome, following the assembly. The governor and his party attended the military tournament at Bell field.

FORESTS CAN PAY ENTIRE STATE DEBT

SALEM, May 29.—With the carrying out of the policies of reforestation as suggested by the government and adopted to several states, Oregon with its one-fifth of the standing timber in the United States, can pay off its state debt to a single generation, Senator Charles L. McNary, chairman of the reforestation, told the members of the Salem chamber of commerce Monday noon at their weekly luncheon.

At the present time 25 per cent of the money received from timber taken from the national forest goes to the state which will mean in a short time that there will be nearly

\$2,000,000 entering the treasury each year, the speaker said. As the price of timber advances the receipts will be larger.

Senator McNary pointed out instances of several states where the forests have not been protected in any manner and as a result the country is in a state of great depression. He appealed to citizens of Oregon not to wait until it was too late to save the forests, but to begin an active reforestation campaign which would keep the timber in perpetuity.

As chairman of the reforestation committee, Senator McNary promised that he intended to introduce to congress a bill offering some plan for national reforestation. Mr. McNary has just completed a tour of seventeen states during the investigation of forestry conditions and is anxious to do all in his power to prevent Oregon from experiencing the disaster through which several of the states with denuded land is now passing.

WILL PLAY AMERICAN MUSIC AT ASHEVILLE

ASHEVILLE, N. C., May 29 (A. P.)—"All-American" music will characterize the program of the thirteenth biennial festival of the National Federation of Music clubs here June 9-17, and is expected by its sponsors to prove that it is not always necessary to turn to Europe for good music, and to show that eventually America should be the music center of the world.

Two outstanding features of the festival, which will also mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization, will be the appearance of a Festival Symphony orchestra, composed of 45 first-chairmen of various symphony orchestras; and a Festival Chorus of several hundred voices. Henry Hadley, American conductor, will lead the orchestra, and Charles N. Boyd will direct the chorus.

The usual biennial contests, open to American composers to encourage the writing of musical compositions will precede the annual convention. At the June festival there will be held also the finals in the series of biennial contests for young American-trained musical artists which are now under way in the states and districts, in voice, violin and piano. Following the tests the winners will appear in concert.

For the 800 Junior and Juvenile clubs affiliated with the Federation a Children's Day will be designated.

In the new auditorium at Montreat, eighteen miles from Asheville, a vesper service will be held Sunday, June 10, a "sunrise sing" featuring morning chorals and odes to the sun, will be given June 13.
