"Give ye them to eat."

Jesus was talking to His disciples and to them exclusively. Who was He talking about? Well, get your Bible and turn to the sixth chapter of Mark and you will find that these people were so hungry to hear Jesus talk about His father and about life in its spiritual meaning that they actually forgot to become physically hungry. And these are the kind of hungry people that Jesus told His disciples to feed.

This idea, which seems to be general, that Jesus expects Christians to feed hungry people indiscriminately—well it gets no authority in the Book.

But hold on there, you mean old chuckling carmudgeon of a Christian! Don't you think that you are going to get off scot-free. For there are plenty of soul-hungry folk that are stomach-hungry, too; and if you have a spark of the grace of God in you, you will have to line up as those twelve disciples did when Christ commanded them to feed five thousand heart-and-stomach-hungry Galileans. What's the answer? Well, it's partly this: Jesus Christ wants no charity from unbelievers; He asks only His followers to co-operate in spiritual feeding the world. Second, He doesn't want us to cast pearls of food, spiritual or physical, before swine.
