NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING HELPS FILL CHURCH PEWS

Dignified and attractive church advertising not only fills pews but often actually pays in dollars and cents, reports Frank L. Snow, professor of industrial journalism.

"Advertising must be backed by real service—church goes must be given food for thought," he says. "Good music helps likewise in holding attendance."

"Sensational advertising of a sensational subject when not backed by an equally sensational sermon does not pay, it has been proved. Accuracy in advertising is always what gets results in the long run. Proper amount of dignity in keeping with the

spirit of worship is generally advocated by churches which obtain the best results through advertising.

"The idea that religion is cheapened through advertising is being exploded. If a church has something worth while to offer why shouldn't it use this means of letting the public know about it? And now that church management is being put on a strictly business basis why shouldn't the church pay for newspaper space?"

Church news, as well as other types of news should be run as news, thinks Professor Snow, but display advertising should be paid for at regular space rates. A series of nearly 75 feature articles on churches written by him proved to be a good circulation builder.

ATTORNEY FREE OF FORGERY CHARGE

Judge Hamilton Grants Motion for Non-Suit Holding That Cost Bill Is Not Instrument Showing Forgery.

Attorney O. S. Brown was found not guilty of the charge of forgery today, when Judge Hamilton dismissed the case on the grounds that the instrument in which Brown is alleged to have signed the name of a client was not sufficient to prove forgery.

The state claimed that Attorney Brown signed the name of a client, A. J. Clarke, to a cost bill following a suit in the justice court in the Cow Creek district. The state introduced several witnesses to substantiate its claim and after its evidence was in Attorney Abraham, representing the defendant, entered a motion for a non-suit, claiming that the indictment was faulty in the fact that a cost bill would not constitute a forgery. The cost bill was not an instrument showing any intent to defraud any parties and was not in any manner capable of injuring the person whose name was signed and could not be considered in the light of a forgery under the terms of the Oregon Statute.

This technical point was argued at great length by both sides and after considering the question Judge Hamilton ruled in favor of the plaintiff and dismissed the suit.

H. S. Grieve, accused of the theft of a car from A. R. Marsh was sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary but was paroled to Rev. C. H. Hilton, and B. W. Hines. The boy has never before been in trouble and a plea was made that he be given a chance to make good. His parents at Los Angeles have been notified and will wire him transportation and he will return home tonight.

GREELEY PREDICTS BIG TIMBER BOOM

EUGENE, June 1.—Oregon and the entire Pacific Northwest will be the scene of unprecedented development in the timber industry during the next decade, amounting to perhaps tenfold the present yearly harvest of commercial lumber, and it will be a permanent industry in the national and state forests, assures Colonel William B. Greeley of Washington, D. C., chief United States forester, who was here to visit the tract for sale in the Oakridge section this afternoon. This region will be the principal one in producing the annual cut of approximately seven billion board feet of timber to be made from the entire national forest area in the United States periodically without depleting the supply, Colonel Greeley pointed out.

"The lumbering industry of the country is coming west, the supply being depleted in the eastern states," he reminded. "The development of these western forests depends upon their being opened up by logging railroads and by trails being built. The national and state forests will supply permanently timber for the United States industry."

As timber tracts in the Cascades and Coast Range in this part of the state, and in the mountains of east Oregon are made accessible by roads, the country will develop he said, since the Cascade streams are not of much value in logging operations.

Congress has appropriated for building fire protection trails and roads and extending highways through the national forest and equivalent close to four cents an acre, Greeley informs; a point he declares few citizens realize. An adequate road building policy has been furthered only during the past three years by congressional appropriations.

National forests are assets to the surrounding communities, 25 per cent of money realized from timber sale being turned over to the state for road and schooling funds. This trip was made into the Oakridge section today by Greeley, assistant forester, E. E. Carter, assistant forester in direct charge of all timber sale work E. E. Ames, of Portland, district assistant forester on this same work, and Nelson F. MacDuff, supervisor of Cascade forest, as one of the inspections being made by the chief of actual conditions in timber sale, land exchange for timber cutting rights and road building operations. The two national officials will spend the most of June in Oregon and Washington before going to Denver to confer on grazing lands with a representative convention of stock raisers.

C. B. Neal supervisor of the Umpqua national forest headquarters in Roseburg, drove the party down here. From here the supervisor and his assistant go to inspect Saniam forest tracts in the Detroit region.

ORDER IS SIGNED FOR ASTORIA RELIEF

SALEM, Ore., May 31.—Judge George J. Bingham, of the circuit court for Marion county, today signed an order dismissing the action brought by S. R. Diefendorf, of Portland, to restrain the state from remitting to the city of Astoria its state taxes as a fire relief measure. Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, and O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, were made defendants in the suit, which specifically sought to prevent Koser from signing a warrant and Hoff from paying the city's first half of state taxes for this year, amounting to about \$38,500.

As relief to Astoria because of the fire last winter that did damage amounting to \$10,000,000 the legislature appropriated an amount equal to the city's state taxes covering a period of seven years, amounting to an estimated half million dollars.

In bringing the suit against the state officials, Diefendorf, acting in the capacity of a taxpayer, alleged that the money was not to be used as represented to restore public property, but to improve streets that primarily would benefit private owners by several million dollars.
