Pajama Outfits Grow In Favor Among Women



PAJAMA negligees are becoming more and more beautiful, and more and more popular. And their variety is legion.

First, there's the nightie pajama of light silk and pastel shade for bedtime. Then there's the negligee-pajama spoken of above, that is for trotting about the house. This latter can be of great simplicity, washable in fabric, and neat in appearance, with a more "dressed-up" look. This "look" is given by the fabric itself, which should be of a dress material; and by the coloring, which should be a deep rich tone; and by little finishing touches in collar or cuff that suggest the mode of the day for daytime frocks. One of these "dressed-up" affairs is sketched at the top left. It shows a moire jacket finished off with a kerchief at the neck after the manner of a frock. Its cuffs are finished likewise. A medallion of gold embroidery trims the jacket, which is

dark blue. The trousers are in black silk. The photo shows Anna Q. Nilsson, featured Paramount player, in a very beautiful and more elaborate negligee-pajama that she wears in the new Paramount picture, "The Rattle of Silk." It is a handsome thing with trousers of jade green, and coat the same, but covered with all-over embroidery in gold and black threads. The sleeves are of the jade, too, and all the bands are black satin. The sketch to the right of the photo shows the costume in detail.

Women are finding pajama suits very practical for housework, when made in denim or sateen, or alpaca. They give plenty of freedom for the limbs, and have no excess material flapping about. Some of these work pajamas are very attractive when worked out in two colors. One good looking combination was a suit with trousers of black sateen, and coat of crotonpe.

But one can't wear them indiscriminately. That is where the danger of the colored shoe lies.

A woman who can't afford the colored shoe as a luxury to be worn only at appropriate times, should beware of them. They certainly do not look well with a tailored suit or gown nor should they be worn for morning wear about town. They are not a business shoe and the girl who utilizes them for this purpose is showing little judgment.

With certain afternoon costumes they are not only permissible, but lovely. The costume, however, must be one whose beauty is augmented by the touch of color in the shoe. It must also be a dressy costume, as the colored shoe is not for the severely cut gown.

At ball games, the race track and for all open air sport events, the colored shoe of the sport variety worn with sports clothes is certainly permissible.

The young society girls and matrons have offered us proof of this fact. Green shoes are particularly popular with the sport frock this season.

Many women are not only tiring of the white shoe for summer wear, but find them so costly to keep clean that they are growing away from them. White kid is unsightly after a few cleanings, as it turns yellowish. Canvas shoes, on the other hand, are not considered dressy.

MY FAVORITE RECIPE

BUTTERSCOTCH COOKIES

(Mrs. Glenn Wimberly and Mrs. M. B. Green.)

4 cups brown sugar, 1 cup butter, 4 eggs well beaten, 1 level tablespoon cream tartar, 1 level tablespoon soda, 1 level tablespoon vanilla, 7 cups sifted flour. These should be mixed at night, and made into two rolls about 2 in. thick. Leave on board until morning, and slice thin with sharp knife and bake.
