ACTS REPEAL OF TO SPEED LAWS

June 2.—Speed limits will be abolished by the legislature in the opinion of the board of government of the city of Roseburg. The board of government, which is the governing body of the city, has passed a resolution to that effect.

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FARM NEWS

(O. A. C. Experiment Sta.)
A gradual continuous growth in pullets will bring the average of the leghorn flock into laying at about six months. At this age the birds will have had a chance to grow sufficient frame and body to stand the strain of heavy egg production.

It is not too early to start on next year's hatching program. Neglect of the breeders now is a hardship to overcome next winter. A nice green run, plenty of shade and cool weather will help to bring the breeders through the summer months in good condition.

Vetch is ready for the silo when the lower pods are about half filled. It makes the best silage when placed in the silo as soon as possible after cutting. It is usually necessary to add water in order to make the vetch keep.

Mites thrive in warm weather. Spraying to control them starts with summer weather and not with appearance of the pests. Usually when first observed they have been multiplying for so long that the place is ready to walk off.

Intense cedar rust is now appearing in some western Oregon pear orchards. The orange spots on the pear fruit and leaves are due to spring infections by spores that blow into the orchard from infected cedar trees affected by the disease. The only satisfactory preventive is removal of infected cedars from the district. The disease is not increasing in the state but the severity of the attack varies from year to year.

Potatoes for late planting are best if kept in a cool place, spread out as thin as possible to avoid excessive sprouting. A corrosive sublimate treatment is the proper method of handling potatoes before they sprout. If they are sprouted badly a half hour treatment is sufficient.

Early maturity and production at the expense of a stunted body is poor business. It is not necessary to hold back pullets that have grown normally.

Cockerels caponized this month and next should make profitable birds for the holiday markets next winter if grown properly. A caponizing set will cost from \$3.50 to \$7.50, and may be bought from any poultry supply house or the larger feed and seed stores.

A large number of hens will be culled out and sold for table use in the next month or two. Many successful breeders dispose of these culled hens to neighbors and their town trade through the "want ad" column of their local newspapers.

Fire blight is often a serious cause of loss in the warmer and irrigated sections of Oregon. Every orchardist in a district where fire blight is known should inspect constantly for first symptoms of the disease and begin cutting it out as soon as it appears. Use the Oregon station blight disinfectant on tree and tools. Formula and instructions for combating the disease may be had on request from the Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis.

DOUGLAS COUNTY DAY AT STATE COLLEGE, JUNE 15.

Arrangements have been perfected at the Oregon Agricultural College to entertain all counties west of the Cascades for one day. The counties are grouped in twos and three depending upon the location and size of the county. Douglas and Lane counties have been allotted June 15th, as the day in which the farmer and his family will be shown everything about the college.

Everyone interested in Agriculture should take this day off and visit the college. Trips will be made over the college farm where the farmer and his wife will be shown just what the college is doing in breeding new plants and animals for his enrichment back on the farm. At this time one can see growing in experimental plots hundreds of varieties of wheat, barley, oats, corn, vetches, alfalfa, clovers and a large number of grasses. The department of farm crops will have been present who will explain the performance of these crops and point out the ones which give promise of increasing the yields, due to natural productiveness and resistance to disease.

Any one interested in what to expect from the use of fertilizers will have an opportunity to see results upon growing crops over a period of years. Many farmers are now becoming interested in irrigation. Here they can get in a few minutes results from irrigation on all the staple crops, also methods of pumping and distribution of the water. Those interested in results of tilling will be afforded some surprises.

The livestock breeder can also see all the types of beef and dairy breeds and learn just what is being done as regards feeds and pastures. The swine breeder will have ample opportunity to get the latest regarding this class of livestock.

If poultry is the line that interests, most every opportunity will be given those present to learn the best practices of management, be the flock large or small. Oregon Agricultural college is known the world over as being the breeders of prize winning birds.

If the farmer and his wife have boys and girls who expect to go on to college, this will be an excellent time to meet the instructors and learn just what this college offers your children in securing a higher education.

Rooms can be had at Waldo Hall at \$10.00 per person for those wishing to stay overnight. Meals will be served cafeteria style in the basement of the hall. For those who desire to camp the city of Corvallis

has a modern clean auto camp which makes a nominal charge of 50 cents per night.

The county agent believes that the trip should be made June 14th, staying over night and be ready for field excursions promptly at 10 o'clock the next morning, June 15th. Make an effort to arrange your farm work so as to take in this most profitable day. PORK LARGE ITEM OF FOOD SUPPLY

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Pork and lard are two of the largest items in the food supply of the American people. The average annual per capita consumption for the last five years was 67.3 pounds of pork and 12.5 pounds of lard, as compared with 60.9 pounds of beef. In several recent years the consumption of pork alone has exceeded that of all other meats combined.

A study of the hog production industry included in the 1922 yearbook of the Department of Agriculture shows that among the farm animals hogs are exceeded in value only by cattle and horses. They are produced on three-fourths of the farms of the country and represent over ten percent of the value of the nation's agricultural production.

Nearly two-thirds of the commercial production of pork is in the corn belt. The amount of corn marketed in the form of hogs varies annually from 30 to 40 percent of the entire crop. Pork exports represent about 20 percent of the country's agricultural exports, and have held a higher place in foreign trade ever since colonial days. In 1790, the first year for which data are available, there was exported approximately 6,000,000 pounds of pork and pork products.

Only 3.5 percent of the hogs on American farms are registered pure bred, and about three-fourths of the total are raised for the market. Cholera is still the most important disease among hogs and takes the highest toll. In 1922 more than 2,700,000 hogs died of the disease, causing a financial loss of approximately \$28,000,000.

TWO INCOME TAX BILLS ON BALLOT

Attorney General Holds That
Titles of Tax Measures
Cannot Be Combined

CONFUSION IS FEARED

Expected That One Petition
Will Be Withdrawn in Order
That Confusion May Not
Be Caused at Election

SALEM, June 2.—The secretary of state, under the Oregon laws is not authorized to combine the ballot titles of the two petitions filed in his department demanding the referendum of the so-called state income tax law enacted at the last session of the legislature. This was the legal opinion handed down by the attorney-general today.

It was set out by the attorney-general in his opinion that the ballot titles differ in respect to the statement of the persons circulating and filing the petitions, which statement is required by law to be a part of the ballot title.

"Although the subject matter of the two ballot titles is identical," said the attorney-general's opinion, "they are as a whole not the same, and there is no provision in the statute directing the procedure to be followed in such matters authorizing the secretary of state or any other officer to make a combination or to eliminate either ballot title."

Both to Occur on Ballot

"The result is that unless some proceeding is brought in the courts, and the court should decide otherwise both of such ballot titles will appear on the official ballots and in the voters pamphlets and to be separately voted upon by the electorate. This may result in some confusion, but administrative officers must follow the law."

The secretary of state also was advised by the attorney-general that he is not authorized to permit the withdrawing of the second petition, demanding the referendum of the
